Jury List for February Term of District Court.
District court convenes at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 11th day of February, 1907. The forenoon will be devoted to the empanelling of the grand jury and the calling of the petit jury.
At 2 o'clock p. m. the petit jury will be sworn and the case of Jeff Smith vs the Western Union Telegraph Company will be called.
The following order made at the last term of the court will be of interest to the public and is hereby copied in full.
"It is ordered that at the February term, 1907, of this court, the grand jury will be notified to appear at 10 o'clock a. m. on the morning of the first day of the term, and the petit jury for the first week at 2 o'clock p. m. same day. Two weeks will be devoted to the trial of civil cases. The criminal docket will be called at 9 o'clock on the third Monday of the term, and the call of that docket will be continued until all of the cases are disposed of.
