

SANTA FE SENDING OUT ITS CONTRACTS.



Advertising Agreements Contain no Provision for Swapping.

The Santa Fe railroad really means its statement that no more transportation is to be swapped for newspaper advertising is manifest through its mailing out about 300 new contracts in which a cash basis of settlement is provided, and in which it is expressly stipulated that no transportation will be issued on account of the swapping. These new contracts are being sent up state papers, and it is said that trade journals will be eliminated to a great extent in arranging for advertising for 1907. The sum of \$150,000 has been set aside in advertising appropriation for this year and it is believed that all of it will be consumed before the trade journals are reached.

When the patient had lost nearly a pint and a half of blood, he relapsed into unconsciousness and the convulsions did not recur for some hours. Then they were much milder than before. Delirium followed and lasted for weeks, but the tetanus subsided gradually. Miller was discharged from the hospital recently a well man.
