Dr. J. B. Garvin of St. John's hospital, Long Island City, reports a remarkable cure of the dreaded disease, tetanus. The man who suffered is Richard Miller, a carpenter. While at work on September 28 last he stepped on a nail which pierced the leather of his shoe and entered his foot. Seven days later lockjaw developed. Every known treatment failed and Miller's condition finally was apparently hopeless. His jaws were locked and convulsions were racking his frame. At this juncture Dr. Garvin, to give some relief to the tension on heart, brain and internal organs, bled the man. When the patient had lost nearly a pint and a half of blood, he relapsed into unconsciousness and the convulsions did not recur for some hours. Then they were much milder than before. Delirium followed and lasted for weeks, but the tetanus subsided gradually. Miller was discharged from the hospital recently a well man.

SANTA FE SENDING OUT ITS CONTRACTS.

Advertising Agreements contain no Provision for Swapping. That the Santa Fe railroad really means its statement that no more transportation is to be swapped for newspaper advertising is manifest through its mailing out about 300 new contracts in which a cash basis of settlement is provided, and in which it is expressly stipulated that no transportation will be issued on account of the advertising. The new contracts are being sent up state papers, and it is said that trade journals will be estimated to a great extent in arranging for advertising for 1907. The sum of \$150,000 has been set aside as an advertising appropriation for this year and it is believed that all of it will be consumed before the trade journals are reached.

Another special appropriation will cover the large amount of flyers, pamphlets, etc., annually issued by the line. The Santa Fe distributes about 150,000 flyers every week during the summer excursion season, and advertise their passenger service by a number of other special methods.

Since the beginning of the year no transportation has been issued in exchange for newspaper advertising from the general passenger agent's office of the Santa Fe in Galveston. A request for transportation by a newspaper man does not meet with a favorable reception. In common with other lines, passes have been mailed to city and county officials and to legislators, but the newspaper people are out of the deal. In direct opposition to the action of the Santa Fe is that of the Katy, which road continues to contract transportation in exchange for advertising, and the contracts are being mailed to city and county officials.

Houston Chronicle. The News, as a republican paper, is frankly glad of the trouble in the democratic ranks, although it has to hold the opinion that Bailey had forfeited his right to re-election. This election of Bailey will prove a boomerang to the democratic party. He is their Senate leader—the spokesman of the party in the national congress. Nothing the investigation will bring forth, no action of the legislature, can affect the work done Tuesday. Bailey is senator for six years more, and he has done nothing to justify, under the law, the National Senate in taking the matter up. Bailey will reappear at Washington, a large bouquet will be on his desk, the Senators will crowd around him, and the farce will bear all the earmarks of sincerity. So crowded they around Depew, and pressed his hand, and made glad, and gave great welcome, and yet they knew in their hearts that the old man should be at home.—Rio Grande News.
