The People Love Fair Play.

The following article is copied from the Honey Grove Signal, a paper that has, all through the controversy, been partial toward Senator Bailey:
"The Signal, in common with other Texas papers and people, expressed the hope that the Bailey investigation would be conducted so fairly that no man could enter a protest. Senator Bailey is entitled to it and the people are entitled to it and when the resolution was adopted we felt sure that no barriers would be raised against it and that the investigation would prove or deal all around. For one we must confess a disappointment. We would be glad to say to the world that nothing has been thrown in the way of a full and fair investigation, but should we do so our conscience would rise up and smite us. In the very beginning the prosecutor selected his attorneys, and the attorneys agreed to serve without pay, but he was told that said attorneys were anti-Bailey partisans and could not appear. A few days since it so happened that neither of the attorneys selected by the committee for the prosecution could be present, and the prosecutor asked if another well-known attorney might be present and question the witnesses. Before the committee could make reply, one of the defendant's attorneys arose and declared that the lawyer named should not question Senator Bailey. And there the matter rested. We have heard of many things, but this is indeed something new under the sun. Another item that looks ugly to us in this: A few mornings since Chairman O'Neal denounced Representative Cooke for a letter the latter had written, and his remarks were ordered printed in the record. Cooke filed a brief written reply and Chairman O'Neal would not allow same to be read in open meeting or printed in the record."
The Signal has never receded from its original position that Senator Bailey is guilty of nothing more than a slight indiscretion, and we are fully confident that this position will be the verdict of the committee, but how much better it would have been for Senator Bailey had the committee thrown down the bars to the prosecution as it did to the defense. The people love fair play, and any act that smacks of partiality is sure to be condemned by them sooner or later."
