CURLEY HOWARD KILLED.
Accidentally Shot and Killed When Swinging in Hands of Platt Lott.

Mr. Joe Rosensky came in from Houston, about two miles west of here, Saturday afternoon and reported that Grant Howard, better known among the colored people as "Curley" Howard, had been shot on his place shortly after the noon hour that day by Platt Lott, another negro boy who is only about twelve or thirteen years of age. The dead boy is about nineteen years old and a son of Chub Howard, a negro well known in this county. Judge J. K. Davidson and Constable J. M. Callison went at once to the scene of the trouble. Constable Callison placed Lott under arrest to await Judge Davidson's verdict of the inquest. Lott claiming the killing was accidental. The two negroes with several others were preparing to go hunting and began scuffling over a loaded gun when, by some means, the gun was discharged, the whole load of small shot taking effect in Howard's chest, making a hole large enough to put a man's fist in. The evidence taken before Judge Davidson showed plainly that the killing was purely accidental, and this was his verdict. Lott was released from custody.
