The Manly Apology.

There is something noble about a manly apology. This is especially true when a business superior frankly admits to a man under him—that he was mistaken in his criticism.

A case came under my notice not long ago which I think shows the right spirit. The manager of an office had taken occasion to reprove severely one of his clerks for what seemed to him a sufficient reason. He had accused the clerk of carelessly neglecting an important request he had made the day before. The clerk did not remember the request, and could not successfully deny that he had been told. The manager dwelt at length on the inefficiency of the clerk and made an unpleasant experience for both.

On the following day the manager discovered among his papers his original memorandum, showing that he had not spoken to the clerk about the matter at all. He immediately called the clerk and made a manly acknowledgment of his own mistake and withdrew his criticism.

"When I heard of that incident I wondered how many business men there are who would have done the same thing. Would not many of them have kept the facts to themselves and let the criticism stand? Such a man thinks the clerk would not remember, so why belittle himself? But the clerk does remember. He feels the injustice keenly, and marks down his respect for the manager just as he surely makes it up when the wrong is righted by a manly apology. Veterans in Tears as They Vote to End Society.

Dallas, Texas, April 22. The Texas Veterans' Association, composed of survivors of the battle of San Jacinto and others who fought in the Texas war of independence, have met and dissolved, never to meet again.

The final meeting was a pathetic one. Tears streamed down the faces of the veterans as they voted to dissolve, because the members were too aged and feeble to attend. At the final meeting it was resolved:

"That we are unalterably opposed to any division or diminution of our beloved State of Texas, and desire that it shall ever be one and indivisible, and for the preservation of such we rely upon the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, who will survive us, and we hope will live as an association to the end of time."

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
