A Verdict of Murder.

Weimar, Tex., May 14. Coroner's investigation was again continued in the Justice Court room early Monday morning. Nothing new was elicited, and after a thorough examination of several witnesses, the Coroner rendered the following verdict: "After holding the investigation open for a few days and tracing every clue, it is the opinion of the court, after viewing the body and examination of the wounds with the assistance of Dr. S. B. McLeary, that the deceased, Shelly McMillan (colored), came to his death by foul means; that the wounds through his head were caused by being struck with some instrument, causing death before he was struck by a train of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railroad, but it is not known to the court whether said death wound was inflicted by some person on said train, or whether the deed was consummated at some other place and the body placed on the track to destroy the evidence of foul play."

The examination is now closed and should any other evidence be obtained it will be up to the grand jury for investigation. Divine News.
