Five Men Were Indicted.

Five men were indicted by the grand jury at San Antonio for the Coleman murder. The grand jury returned true bills against Marion Hope, Frank Maibaum, J. W. Kincheloe, Will Clements and George Shoaf. All are released on bail. Marion Hope, one of the men arrested, was released in the sum of \$10,000, while the four other men, Frank Maibaum, J. W. Kincheloe, Will Clements and George Shoaf, were released in the sum of \$5,000 each on the charge of conspiracy to murder. The habeas corpus proceedings were held Wednesday morning immediately following the arrests, and a number of wealthy men were present from out of the city ready to sign up for them. There are some twelve to fifteen signatures to the different bonds growing out of this case.

The indictments grew out of the killing of James Coleman in the Iron Front saloon at San Antonio three weeks ago. The evidence submitted to the grand jury was, for the most part, the written testimony of the witnesses at the inquest proceedings.

A farmer woman sat for two solid hours in front of one of the business houses here last Saturday waiting for her husband to buy his pound of tobacco and a little bunch of fence wire. When he returned with his purchase she smiled at him sweetly and said she hoped he'd found the kind of tobacco he liked. And after they returned home she probably milked the cow, fed the pigs and then went to the house, got supper, washed up the dishes and put the children to bed while the man tried his tobacco. She looked like that very sort of a woman. —Ex.

The election for a city mayor to fill the unexpired term of Mr. J. C. Reister is set for the 2nd day of July. So far no one has officially announced for the office but the friends of Mr. J. E. Roberts are urging him to become a candidate for the office. If Mr. Roberts should decide to make the race, a vacancy will be made in the board of aldermen and Mr. E. S.
