Letter From Iowa.

Gladbrook, Iowa, June 6, '07.
EDITOR HEADLIGHT,
Eagle Lake, Texas.

On May 15th, my mother and I started on our northward trip. We reached Franklin Springs, Mo., where we visited relatives on the third day of journey. We next visited at Blackton, Iowa, several days and reached our destination just two weeks after we left Chesterfield.

Although the early part of my childhood was spent in Iowa, I have lived in the Southland so long that my recollections of this country are dim, therefore my surroundings are very novel and interesting. While the farmers in Southern Texas were sowing their rice, this country was fragrant with the scent of apple blossoms and musical with the hum of the honey-bee.

The farmers here have finished planting corn some time ago. Most of the Irish potatoes are up and the early varieties are several inches high. The sweet potato is not so common.

Iowa has been visited by copious rains and the small grains are doing well. The principal of these are oats, barley and wheat. While I am enjoying my sojourn here, I still claim Texas as my home, and many times do I call to mind my friends in the South.

We learn that the "Whang-doodle" will change time, commencing on the 16th. This new time card will be very convenient for the people of the local country and will give them about three or four hours to do their trading in Eagle Lake and allow them to return home same day.

Assessing Property.

In the light of Governor Campbell's recent reviewing State laws, appearing in the Dallas News of May 18, I am puzzled how to proceed to render property for taxation.

I have a letter from the tax assessor of Collin county, saying: "I send you copy of your last year's tax list. Please place 'true value' on each piece of property in proper column; sign and swear to list before local tax assessor."

According to the recent agitation about "full rendition," the "true value" must mean the full reasonable cash value of the property. But is this the way property is being rendered, this year?

Or are some thus rendering it, while others are rendering it as before? I have been reading up on it, but up to this hour I am unable to come to any conclusion what is actually being done. I have understood that Captain McDonald has been supervising southwestern county assessors, compelling them, with the consent of the governor, to take "full value" renditions. I have never seen this contradicted. And yet in the governor's most recent utterance on this question we have this "in explanation" of the "full rendition law."

"The new law relative to rendition and assessment of taxable property becomes effective on August 12, 1907, and, therefore, all ad valorem taxation for the year 1907 must be under the old law, with the exception of the rate of taxation, which, if there is an increase in taxable values and the receipts from other sources justify a reduction, then such rate is required to be reduced. The new laws, with the exception of the intangible tax law, which is in effect now, will first begin to operate in the year 1908."

If "the new laws" will first begin to operate in the year 1908, why all this confusion? Why are not assessors so directed? Why is not this matter settled from authoritative sources to the end that we may all know where we are "at"? Governor Campbell's statement, as above quoted, would seem to settle it, but no assessor seems to have an authoritative statement to that effect, or at least none seem to be acting upon it.
