An Arrest Was Made.

Quite a sensation was created here last Saturday evening when Mr. Will Parks, who had been working at the Paschall market, was arrested by City Marshal Abe Beakes on a warrant sworn out by Mr. Olva Davis charging him with having set fire to the Paschall meat market building Thursday night of last week. At the examining trial Wednesday, Mr. Davis testified that he had sworn out the warrant against Mr. Parks on evidence furnished him by Charlie McDow and George Beakes, both of whom had stated that they had seen Parks set fire to the building, but when placed on the witness stand and under oath, both McDow and Beakes swore that they knew absolutely nothing concerning the origin of the fire and that the statements previously made by them on the streets and elsewhere were untrue. Several more witnesses were placed on the stand, but no evidence whatever was brought out against Mr. Parks and Judge Davidson, before whom the case was tried, at once dismissed the charge against him.

County Attorney Holt represented the State and the defense was represented by W. M. Williamson assisted by W. S. Strickland.

There are many peculiar circumstances connected with the affair, but the thing yet remains as much of a mystery as ever. No doubt the next grand jury will give this affair a thorough investigation.

Died on Train.

Austin Francis, a negro preacher, died on the Santa Fe "Whangdoodle" train coming to Eagle Lake, and while the train was between Lakeside and this station, last Wednesday. The negro was a very large man and the supposition is that he died from heart failure, as he was in the best of spirits and was laughing and talking with other passengers in the car, when he began struggling, gave a few gasps and fell back dead in his seat. The scene was quite a pathetic one, as with the dead man were his two little daughters, about four and six years old. They had boarded the train for this station at Eldridge, where they were on their return from his wife's funeral. Francis was pastor of one of the colored churches of Houston. He was raised in this country on Capt. Wm. Dupont's plantation and is remembered by many people here.
