Commercial Club Organized. A business men's club, composed of the business men of this city and to be known as the Commercial Club of Eagle Lake was organized last Tuesday night with a membership of about thirty.

Dr. F. O. Norris was made president, F. A. Kessler secretary and W. F. B. Wicker, treasurer.

At the very first meeting of the club it was decided to make an effort to get a ferry boat placed on the river near the Causey place, and a committee was appointed to look into same and report at next meeting. The second meeting of the club was held Thursday night and a report from this committee was heard. The committee submitted the following proposition from Wm. Tait: "That if a road be opened from Ramsey's Point road to the river and if a cash donation of \$200 be made him, that he would open a road to the river straight out to the prairie through his land, put in a good ferry boat and maintain same at his expense, and he obligates himself to gin and market his cotton crop in Eagle Lake, amounting to over a hundred bales." The club has taken the proposition under advisement and a committee, J. R. Westmoreland, J. R. Thatcher and L. J. Burger, was appointed to interview the business men of the town and submit Mr. Tait's proposition to them and learn what each man will donate towards getting up this amount of money. Another move of the club will be to secure several live, competitive cotton buyers for Eagle Lake during the cotton season and to make this town a live cotton market.
