FIVE THOUSAND EXPECTED.

Encouraging Reports Have Been Received From All Neighboring Towns and the Committee is Now of the Opinion that not less than Five Thousand Visitors Will be Here on Fourth of July.

AMPLE ACCOMMODATIONS ARE MADE

To Entertain in Royal Style as Many Visitors As Will Attend the Celebration in Eagle Lake on the Fourth of July. An Invitation is Extended to Everybody and Everyone Will be Welcome.

The barbecue committees have been receiving most flattering reports from all the neighboring towns and they now estimate that the crowd will be much larger than was at first expected, and it is thought by those at the head of the affair that not less than five thousand visitors will be in Eagle Lake on the Fourth of July. Ample accommodations have been made to entertain fully this number.

About thirty calves and a number of sheep and hogs will be barbecued for the occasion. Messrs. J. W. Thatcher and J. T. Vick will have charge of the barbecueing, and it goes without saying that the meats will be prepared in a most tempting style.

There will be a big crowd in our city on this occasion and it would be well for those intending remaining over for the big ball at night to write and have their rooms reserved at the hotels. The local hotels are the Druggists' Home, the Lake Hotel and the Callison House.

Everything is now in readiness for the big event. The local baseball team has received a number of challenges for a game on this day, but with just which team it will be, it has not yet been definitely decided, though most likely it will be the Houston Post team of Houston. The team that will be here on that day will be a good, strong team, and the locals will be considerably strengthened for the game. The ball game will be one of the leading attractions of the day and the game will be an interesting and sensational one.

The big parade will be a leading feature of the celebration. Most every business house in the city will have a float of some kind in the parade. Everyone in the city is expected to have their vehicles decorated and take part in this parade. The parade will form on the vacant lot near the school house, and all who expect to take part are requested to meet there not later than ten o'clock as the parade will start from there at 10:30 o'clock sharp.

The parade will be led by the Eagle Cornet Band, followed by the Eagle Lake Fire Company; then the floats and decorated vehicles. All are especially invited to take part in the parade, and those desiring any further information concerning the same will see Messrs. P. H. Barker or J. R. Thatcher.

After the tournament riding is over will come the barbecue dinner, and after dinner will be the gun shoot. Those desiring information concerning this may communicate with Messrs. John Gwynn, George Vick or James Barnett.

During the afternoon there will be a croquet polo climbing for the pleasure of the little boys and a prize will be given to the successful one.

The crowning feature of the celebration will be the dance at night. As previously stated in this paper, an admission of 50 cents will be charged for gentlemen, and the amount realized from same will be donated to the Eagle Lake Fire company. The pavilion erected for the dance will not be of the ordinary picnic dance platform order. The floor will be of tongue and groove lumber and will be put in first class condition.

An especial invitation is extended to the people of all the neighboring towns and all the country people in this community. This barbecue is not gotten up to make money out of the visitors, for everything will be free. It is in keeping with the annual barbecues the citizens of Eagle Lake have been giving for the past three years. For this one, however, more ample arrangements have been made, and the celebration in Eagle Lake on July 4th will be the biggest thing of the kind ever given in Colorado country. You are invited. Uses for Kerosene.

Kerosene oil is a great help to loosen dirt, used in various ways. A few drops on a rag will clean a wash basin much more easily than soap. It is also good for cleaning an iron sink. If the children's hands are stuck up with balsam or wagon grease, rub them with a rag wet in kerosene before applying soap and water. If they get wagon grease on their clothes, a little soap and kerosene will take it out. To clean dirty clothes, such as canvas towels, take a tablespoonful of kerosene and a small piece of soap. Boil these together with a quart of water till it makes an emulsion. Put this in your boiler with enough cold water to cover your clothes and let it come to a boil, stirring the clothes occasionally. This saves a lot of hot rubbing. It is also very good to soften children's shoes which have become hard by being soaked with water. Suburban Life.

Kills Johnson Grass.

There is a great amount of prejudice and abuse of the Johnson grass that is not justified. Where stock is raised upon grass and hay the Johnson grass furnished a good hay, and the quantity is more than twice that of timothy. It can be annihilated in two or three ways. If the grass be mowed when the embryo seeds are unpollinated, they are incapable of sprouting, therefore will not reproduce plants. If the land on which the Johnson grass is growing be plowed four inches during the winter and harrowed both ways, 50 per cent of the roots can be extracted from the soil, and the exposure to the freezes will kill them. Don't plow deep, as the soil will recover the roots—plow about as deep as the harrow can penetrate.

Try oats and mow them when in the dough state and the oats and Johnson grass will furnish a good quantity of hay.

Two years' grazing will destroy Johnson grass—nothing can live without a head longer than this period.
