Talking About Rice Prospects.

The Rice Industry has this following in its last issue:

Mr. J. J. Whitley, general manager of the Lakeside Rice Mills, was in Houston a few days ago. He stated so far as he could learn the present crop of rice is in fine condition and promises a good yield. He has closed the contract with Mr. D. J. Hayes for the erection and installation of an 80,000-bushel elevator at the Lakeside mills. He said that his mills were being given a general overhauling, and there will be a number of minor changes, but none of any particular importance, with the exception of the installation of some new grading machinery. Mr. Whitley thinks we will have a very prosperous year for rice farmers, but says there are many things which might occur to change the present conditions between now and harvest time.

Mr. B. L. Vineyard of the Eagle Lake Rice and Irrigation Canal Company, reports the rice in the Eagle Lake district in fine condition and that his canal company have some as fine rice as he ever saw. He says: "There will be an increase in the acreage in the Eagle Lake district of between 20 and 25 per cent. We will have no late rice on our canal, nor do I think there will be any in our district. All of our rice was planted early, and on the lands watered by our canal we do not allow any rice to be planted after June 1st of each year. We will have some very early rice, but I do not think we will have either the first sack or the first field of rice. The Eagle Lake Rice Mills are being put in first class condition and we will

be better able to handle the crop this year than ever before. While there will be no material changes in the mills with the exception of an 80,000-bushel elevator, for the building of which I have just closed a contract with Mr. D. J. Hayes, said elevator to be completed in ample time for the handling of the 1907 crop, yet we have given the entire plant an overhauling and put all the machinery in first-class condition." Mr. Vineyard thinks we will have a five-million-bag crop this year, but considers that figure the maximum. He thinks the increase in acreage in Texas will be about 20 per cent, and that the new crop will open about \$3.50 per sack for good rice.
