Talking About Rice Prospects.

The Rice Industry has the following in its last issue:

Mr. J. J. Whatley, general manager of the Lakeside Rice Mills, was in Houston a few days ago. He stated so far as he could learn the present crop of rice is in fine condition and promises a good yield. He has closed the contract with Mr. D. J. Hayes, said elevator to be completed in ample time for the handling of the 1907 crop, yet we have given the entire plant an overhauling and put all the machinery in first-class condition.

Mr. Vineyard thinks we will have a five-million-bag crop this year, but considers that figure the maximum. He thinks the increase in acreage in Texas will be about 20 per cent, and that the new crop will open about \$2.50 per sack for good rice.
