

# Broke up in a Squabble.

The Eagle Lake baseball team with Manager John Guyan in charge, left Monday morning for Yorktown for a series of three games with the team at that place but the first game ended in a squabble over a very rank decision of the umpire (a Yorktown man) and the Eagle Lake boys quit the field and took the first train out for Yorktown where they have since been playing a series of games. A special from Yorktown in the Houston Chronicle dated July 10th, has this to say of the game:

The first of a series of three games with the Eagle Lake Post team was played here yesterday. On account of the rank decision in the first inning, they refused to play further and forfeited the game. The Eagle Lake team was composed of a walkover, but now admit that the Yorktown team was the better proposition they had gone up against this season. The nine was supposed to be the Eagle Lake nine, but we have since learned that they are the old Houston Post nine.

Batteries: Yorktown, Hicks and Jett. Eagle Lake, Peobles and Sisson. Peobles struck out 6 and allowed 7 hits. Hicks struck out 2 and allowed 5 hits. This won the twelfth game our team won out of thirteen this season.

As we understand it, the "close decision" referred to by the correspondent at Yorktown was this: It was the last inning and the score stood 2 to 1 in favor of Eagle Lake. Yorktown was at bat with two outs and a runner on third base. There were two strikes on the batter when he bunted the ball which went foul (according to rules, the batter is out) but the umpire called the runner safe at first, and the man at third scored—which tied the score, 2 to 2. All that Eagle Lake asked for was that the decision at this critical stage of the game be made according to rules. This is the first time that the Eagle Lake team has ever quit the field in any ball game, but when it was plain to them that rules were not to be considered and that they were to be robbed of a game which they had already justly won, they did the only thing left for them to do—quit the field and forfeit the game.

Referring to the same game, the Yorktown correspondent in the North View says:

The "Inevitable" Posts of Eagle Lake came to Yorktown yesterday afternoon to cross bats with the Eagle Lake team. The game was the finest played on the local diamond this season. Neither side scored till the beginning of the 6th inning. With a man on third and one on second a nice little single over third was all that was needed to make a run. In the last of the eighth with two men down and a man on second, Metz tied the score with a three-bagger. The Posts made another run in the ninth by a couple of errors. Our first man up in the ninth was put out. Korth batted safe, stole second and Metz was then caught out by a fly to right. Korth then stole third and Hicks made a bunt, scattering Korth. The captain contended that the umpire made a wrong decision on first and wanted the locals to give them the game, 2 to 1. The umpire gave the boys 15 minutes to get back into the game, which they ignored, whereupon the game was called, 9 to 6 in favor of Yorktown. The Posts left hurt at this and broke their contract, leaving for home last night on the Crockett. Every inducement was offered to get them to finish the series, but they refused to do so.

The Eagle Lake baseball team returned yesterday morning from Yorktown where they had been since Tuesday, having played three games with the team of that place. Eagle Lake won all three games and got sweet revenge for that game in which Yorktown took it out of us to a tune of 2 to 0 here about two years ago before about three thousand visitors. The scores of the Yorktown games were: First game, Eagle Lake 8, Yorktown 2; second game, Eagle Lake 8, Yorktown 3; third game, Eagle Lake 11, Yorktown 2. Our boys are loud in their praise of the royal treat-

ment they received while in Yorktown, and they are anxious that the Yorktown boys come to Eagle Lake for a return series that they may have a chance to reciprocate.

The Eagle Lake baseball team left last night on the Cane Belt for Bellville where they play a series of games with the team at that place Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The boys from Luling will be here for three games Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The three games with Luling promise to be the best played this season and they should be attended by large crowds. Let everybody come out to these games.

"Frazar's Colts," the second nine of Eagle Lake under the management of Abraham Frazar, went over to Wallis yesterday by private conveyance to play a game with the team at that place. The "Colts" were defeated by Wallis in a score of 6 to 3.
