ON and after July 12th the barber who ties you back in a chair with a towel that has done the same service for customers before you without having interviewed the laundryman will be subject to a heavy penalty. He must keep his shop and all his paraphernalia in a thoroughly sanitary condition and in addition to this he must stand an examination and secure a permit, and pay a license of \$1 per year, and he must display his certificate in front of his chair in a conspicuous place. It will not be necessary for the barbers who have been working as journeymen in this State for more than two years to stand the examination, but all will have to secure the certificate and pay the fee of \$1. Apprentices having worked two years at the business may stand the examination. The union requires that apprentices work three years, but it is stated that this will not interfere, for the reason that an apprentice is granted an apprentice card and after standing the examination he can continue under that card to a journeyman's card.
