NOMINATED FOR MAYOR.

W. S. Strickland Was Named by the White Man's Party as Candidate for Mayor of Eagle Lake.

A meeting of the members of the White Man's Party of the city of Eagle Lake was held at the park Wednesday afternoon at which Mr. W. S. Strickland was unanimously nominated for mayor of the city of Eagle Lake to fill the unexpired term of Mr. J. C. Reister, resigned. Mr. Strickland has formerly served in this official capacity and is in every way acquainted with the city's needs. He contended that he did not want the nomination, but the honor was thrust upon him anyway.

At this meeting it was recommended by the White Man's Party that the city pay the mayor a monthly salary of \$25.00 a month, and also that the members of the board of aldermen vote themselves a salary of \$2.00 per day while in service of the city.

Dr. Norris was elected permanent president of the said White Man's Party and Bruce McCarty secretary. A fee of \$2.00 for each meeting for both the president and secretary was agreed upon, this amount to be paid by the members of said party.

It was also recommended at this meeting that Mr. John Tatters be appointed by the members of the school board to fill the unexpired term of Dr. F. O. Norris, resigned, as school trustee.
