County Farm Sold.

Columbus, Texas, August 6.—All that portion of the Colorado county farm lying south of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio railroad track was sold at public auction today. The field notes of the survey made several years ago show that the tract contains 470 acres, but changes in the course of the Colorado river, along which it lies, have made more land and the tract now embodies 535 acres of cotton, corn and Johnson grass land.
