COMMISSIONERS' COURT will meet the second Monday in the month and fix the tax rate for the year. The tax rolls will not be completed for formal approval until September, so the Bee has been informed. It is understood the increased values of the county will admit of a marked decrease in the county rate, twenty-one cents on the \$100 of which have been already abolished. 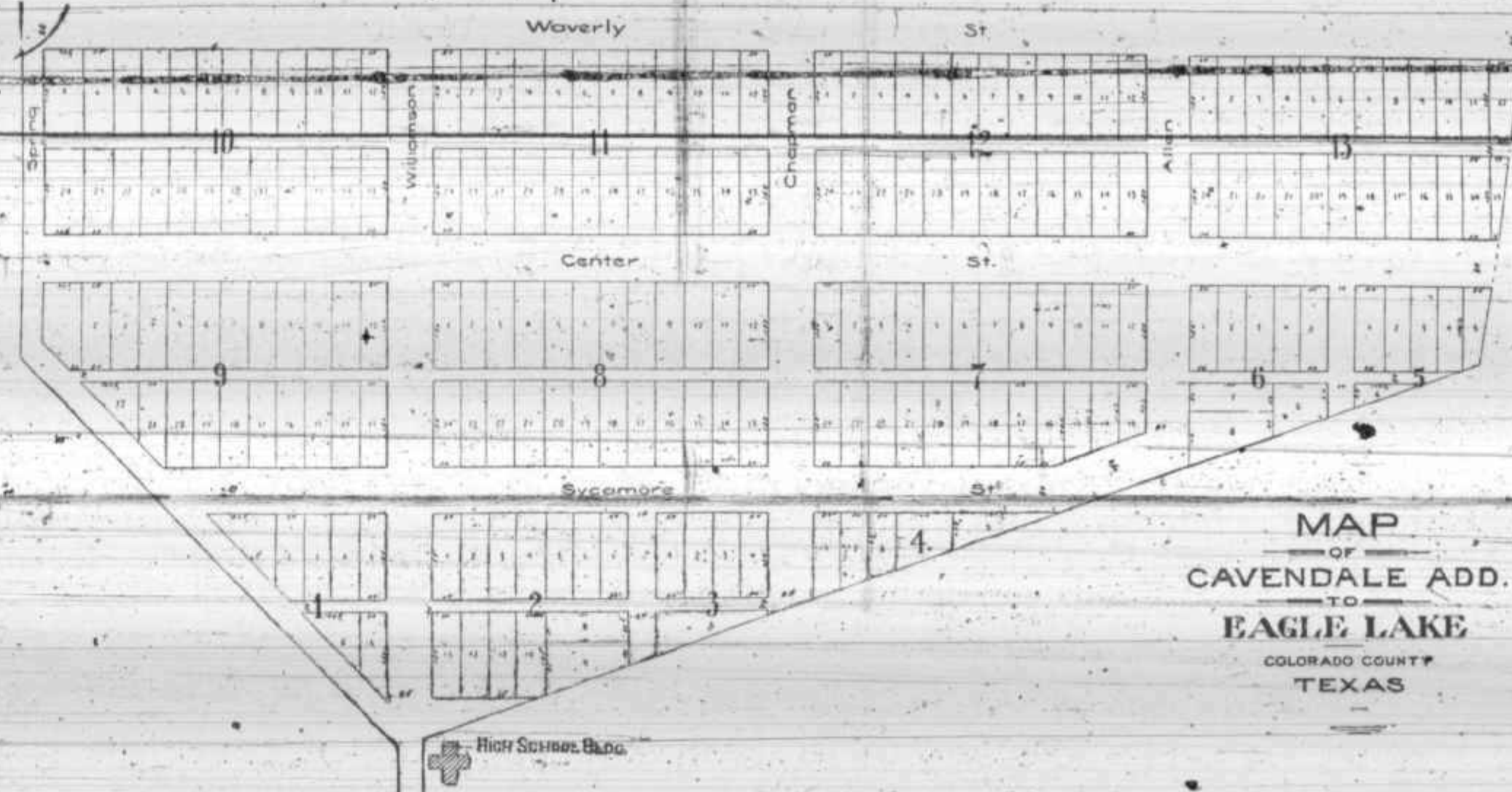
