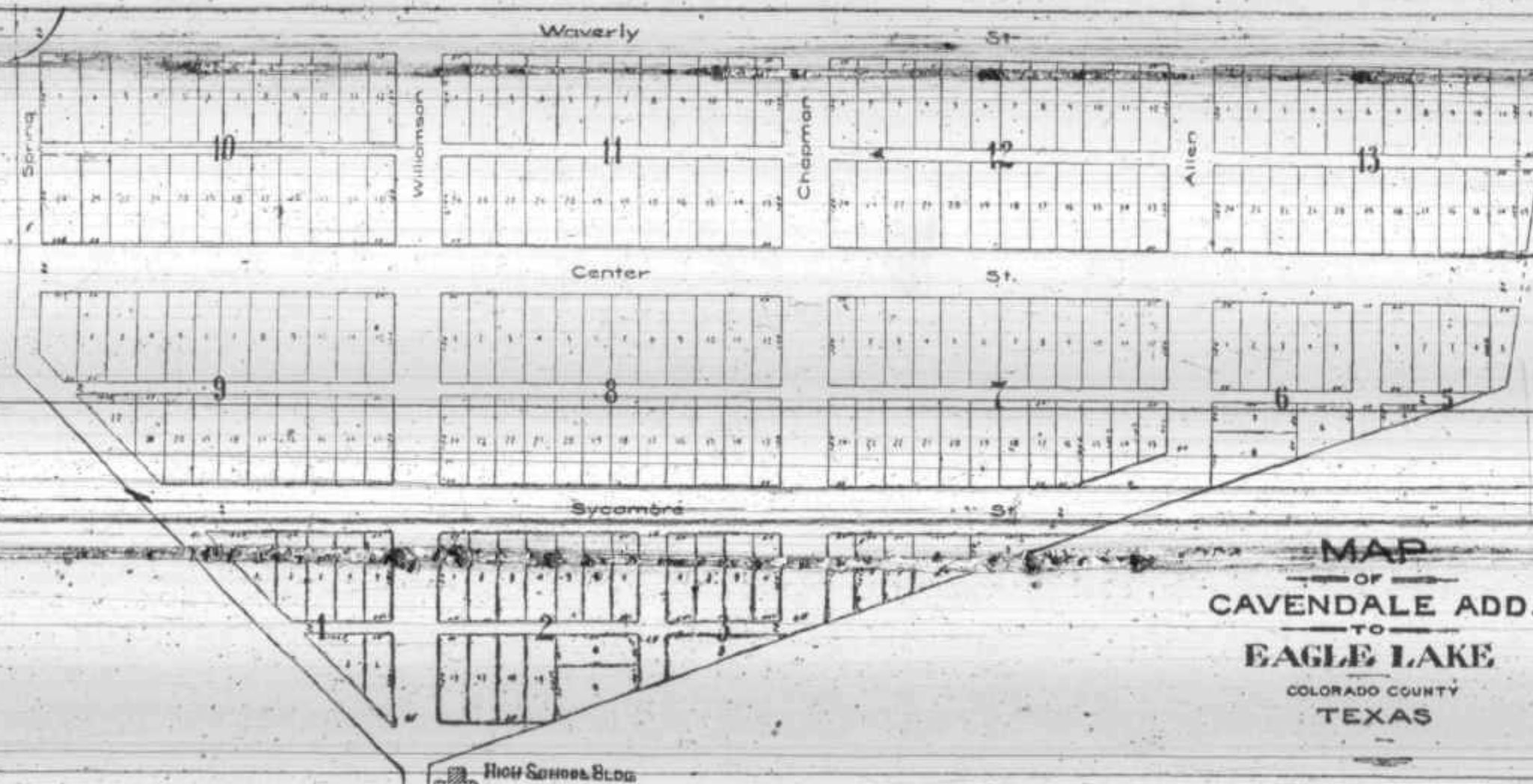

Captain Garrity on Holding Cotton.

All of the present plan of holding cotton and controlling prices by gradual marketing originated in the mind of a Texan—Captain Jas. Garrity, of Corsicana. A number of years ago there appeared an interview in Farm and Ranch with Capt. Garrity, who is both farmer and banker, telling just how, by holding back a portion of the crop of cotton in each one of the cotton states, the price of cotton would be wonderfully improved. Captain Garrity has seen the fulfillment of his prophecy. He is, however, as much in earnest about the matter of bettering prices as in the beginning.

Recently, in a meeting of the state executive committee of the S. C. A. held in Dallas, Captain Garrity expressed himself in about these words: "I am satisfied that something more can be done than has been accomplished in this matter of building warehouses, storing cotton and holding up prices, and that the S. C. A. and the Farmers' Union can be brought together to do this. I hope and pray that day may soon come." Some one asked him at this point: "If your neighbors had cotton in a warehouse and wanted money, would you advance money on it?" To this he replied promptly, "I would be proud to do it; it is the best collateral in the world. But some farmers will not patronize warehouses that have added 1 to 3 cents a pound to their cotton this season. Any man who is awake to his own interests and who will not patronize this warehouse system ought to be marked as a traitor to self and to country. A man too ignorant to read should be able to understand this."

"I am in close touch with warehousemen—I will give you an instance of the benefits arising from the system. A couple of farmers had 20 bales of cotton gathered rough shod, and were offered 9 cents for the 20 bales. They put them in the warehouse and sold a little later for 10 1/2 cents. A profit of \$100 to the growers of 20 bales. These things should be known. In the middle of last November, cotton was on the market at 10 cents at ports, we were offered 10 1/2 cents for cotton at the warehouse; we demanded 11 cents and got it. Come all, as one man, and store every bale of cotton and hold for a fair price. It grieves me to see my brother farmers dragging on in such a poor way. The farmers can now get help as well as sympathy from the business men in this matter. Our first efforts have been worth 600 million dollars already to the farmers and business men of the south. Now is not the time to relax our efforts. The warehouse is the key to the situation." Farm and Ranch.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Prof. O. F. Cooke, investigator for the department of agriculture, left this city today for Victoria, Texas, to carry on the work of experimenting with the Guatemalan cotton plant. In speaking of the Guatemalan cotton plant today, Dr. B. T. Galloway, chief of the bureau of plant industry, said the department has been working with the Guatemalan cotton plant now for about three years and so far has received very encouraging results. All present efforts are being directed to the breeding of this plant in with the native cotton in hopes of obtaining a sturdier growth and one that will withstand the ravages of insects.
