

Houston, Texas, Aug. 21.—Mr. E. A. Calvin, general manager of the Farmers' Union Cotton Company, urges the cotton planters of Texas not to sell their cotton for less than 15c and to ignore any element or association that counsels otherwise. He bases his prediction that cotton will easily reach the 15c mark on observations placed while abroad in the interest of the union while he was president of the Farmers' Union and on the knowledge that the Texas crop is reported to be in bad condition. On this subject he made the following statement to News Item yesterday:

"As you are probably aware, the Fort Worth crop has averaged 15c as the minimum price for cotton this year. If the farmers will follow the advice of the convention there will be no trouble in getting this price, in my opinion. It is a legitimate price for the staple based on purely natural conditions. Any person or association that counsels the farmer to sell for less does not represent the best interests of the grower, and any farmer that disposes of his cotton for less than 15c is standing in his own light."

"I know positively that cotton goods for future delivery are being sold on a basis of from 15c to 18c per pound. The spinners expect to pay that amount for their cotton during the coming season, and have fixed their prices to the consumers accordingly. I talked with a number of spinners while in Europe, and every one of them expects to pay from 15c to 18c. They told me that they were fixing the prices for cotton goods for future delivery on that basis, and the merchant here who is buying cotton goods to be delivered in January and later will tell you that cotton goods will be higher."

"The farmer who sells for less than the price adopted by the convention is blind to his own interests. Speculators who are short, or have other ulterior motives for keeping the price lower than its natural level, may counsel the farmers to sell for 12c, but the farmers are learning better. Advice to the growers to sell for 12c on the day that cotton was quoted at 13c is ridiculous."

"Fifteen cents was the price fixed by the Farmers' Union of Texas. This price is subject to revision by the National Union, which convenes in Little Rock, Ark., on Sept. 3. Every cotton-growing State will be represented at the Little Rock meeting and the price will be fixed for the entire South. Conditions in every section of the cotton-producing area will be taken into consideration and the price fixed by the Texas branch of the union may be raised or lowered. Whatever the outcome of the meeting, the farmers who are raising cotton will do well to heed the advice of the union and turn a deaf ear to the speculators."

Richmond, Texas, Aug. 21.—The cotton is opening so rapidly that cotton pickers are in demand. "The recent showers have benefited the cotton but not as much as they would have done had they have come six weeks ago. It has been demonstrated that plowing pays in dry weather. A planter here plowed some of his cotton nine times and on a piece of ground close by planted cotton the same time, but did not plow it more than four times. The land plowed nine times will yield three-fourths of a bale to the acre, while that on the other piece will not yield more than one-third."

The fire escape law which takes effect September 1, requires every stair room in every boarding house two stories high to be supplied with a rope that will reach the ground. Tall buildings must have fire escapes. This should boom the rope industry here and elsewhere.—Cuero Star.
