Last week there passed away at Columbus, Dr. John H. Bowers, aged 97 years, who in his early life was one of the prominent physicians of Texas, having at one time attended General Sam Houston. Dr. Bowers is still remembered by the older settlers of this country. Dr. J. E. Lay was speaking about him the day following his death. The Bowers family came to Lavaca county in the fall of 1851 and the spring previous cholera had ravaged the land. Dr. Bowers came up from Columbus and treated the people of the old Force settlement, and his services were never forgotten. The Force settlement was so called after Ben Force, who resided there. The Force name itself is now almost forgotten in the annals of this county, though Mrs. James Branon is a daughter, and Mrs. D. R. Breeden of Hallettsville a grand-daughter. Dr. Lay was acquainted with Dr. Bowers and his story is interesting and varied one. The man was born in Alsace and first went to India, afterwards coming to the strenuous republic of Texas and participating in many of the historic events of those days. He lived at Columbus and had a practice that was enormous, extending as far west as Peach Creek in Gonzales county.—Hallettsville Herald.

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ARRESTED FOR HORSE THEFT.
Mr. Smith's Horse Located at Cuero and two Young Lavaca County Men Arrested in Connection With Same.

On last Wednesday afternoon Sheriff A. B. Noble of Hallettsville brought to this place Joe Hoffenack and Berry Moore, two men who had been arrested on a charge of horse theft. The charge was made against Hoffenack, and Moore is held by the officers who believe he is implicated in the matter.

Two weeks ago, Hoffenack sold a horse here to Mr. John Raezer, who in turn sold the horse to Herbert D. Hurd. On the same afternoon the horse, saddle and bridle of Mr. Wm. Smith of this place mysteriously disappeared, and the officers were at once notified. Sheriff Noble was informed of the selling of the horse here by young Hoffenack, and at once went to work on the case, and Wednesday effected the arrest of the two persons above named. The horse sold to Mr. Raezer was stolen in Yoakum, so it has since developed, and the owners of said horse were here Thursday to claim their property. Sheriff Noble brought Mr. Smith's saddle here with him Wednesday, and same was identified at once, although the horn had been recovered and the name of A. L. Baring, Eagle Lake, Texas, maker, had been scratched off. At the time of his visit here Sheriff Noble had not located Mr. Smith's horse, but City Marshal Beakes has since informed us that young Hoffenack has practically admitted everything and stated that he traded this horse for a mule in Cuero. Moore claims that he is innocent of the crime and did not know where Hoffenack had gotten the horses. Both are young men, but we are informed by City Marshal Beakes that Hoffenack was previously sent to the penitentiary by Sheriff Noble on a similar charge, and doubtless his chances for a return trip are very flattering. Mr. Smith has not yet recovered his bridle which was a very fine one. Same being a present to him he valued it very highly. Mr. Smith's horse was stolen in broad daylight, the horse being hitched in front of the Smith & Walker market right in the heart of town.
