MR. J. W. WESTMORELAND
showed the HEADLIGHT some very
fine stalks of corn born last year

which were grown on the Harbert
place on the river. This corn is

the regular Mexican June corn
and four acres were planted on

this place this year as an experi-
ment. The stalks had an average

of two well developed and well
filled ears which are now in

roasting ear and were on the
stalk about eight feet from the

ground. Mr. Westmoreland
stated that the stalks shown us

were not picked, and that the
whole four acres would average
up just as well.

A number of the cotton farmers
in this vicinity are now through

picking cotton. Some are selling
their cotton as fast as it is being

picked out and others are holding
it for higher prices. Fifty odd

Mexican cotton pickers were brought
in here from other points last

Sunday morning.

Messrs. O. A. Murphy and W. King
who are plating rice in the

Nottawa section, fast week sold
900 bags of rice to the Texas Rice

Mill of Houston for \$2.71. This
rice was sold in bulk, the mill

allowing 3 cents per sack for sack-
ing and furnishing the sacks

which makes the price equivalent
to \$3.88. Good prices for rice

have been prevailing this season,
but so far this is the highest

of which we have heard that has
been paid this year.
