Mrs. M. E. Guynn and Mrs. W. W. Rayburn spent a couple of weeks at Seabrook, returned home Tuesday.



Mayor Strickland is impartial in the discharge of the official duties of the city, and plays no favorites, and he is seeing that every law of the city is strictly enforced to the letter. Mr. Strickland has many things in view which he proposes to carry out for the betterment of the town of Eagle Lake. Notably among these things is the building of a new and modern school building. Another thing for which Mr. Strickland is striving, and which will be commended by every person in the town, is the reduction of the city taxes. His plan, which is a good one, is to have every tax payer in the city render taxes at full value, then have the tax rate reduced as much as possible. In conversation with the HEADLIGHT man a short while ago, Mr. Strickland stated that in his opinion the city taxes will be reduced at least ten per cent. Mayor Strickland is conducting the city's administration on conservative and business-like methods.

CAVENDALE. A Handsome Residence

Adjoining to the City of Eagle Lake.

Like all other progressive and rapidly growing towns, Eagle Lake has reached the point where a residence addition has become a necessity. Cavendale consists of 17 blocks of high, perfectly drained residence property, 14 feet above the level of the public square, the public lake, and ditched and drained in such a manner that water cannot stand anywhere in the townsite. This property is owned by San Antonio capitalists and is under the able management of Mr. W. M. Williamson, one of our city's prominent attorneys. This addition is located one block north of the public school building and in every respect is the most ideal residence section of the town. The lots in Cavendale are 50x150 feet, and there is a 20-foot alley running through each block. The streets are 60 feet from curb to curb, are well graded and are now being gravelled. The sidewalks are 10 feet wide and, from 40 to 18 inches above the level of ditches. The 10-foot sidewalks give ample room for the planting of shade trees, which the management will do at its own expense as soon as the sap goes down and the proper time arrives for planting trees. The management proposes to plant a tree every fifty feet around each block, making a shade tree for each block. The piping has been ordered and as soon as same arrives, the putting in of water mains throughout the townsite will be begun, and this

NEGRO KILLED AT BONUS.

Knives Were Used; One Killed and the Other Wounded.

A fight between two negroes, Dave Roberson and Dave Schacafor, in which knives were the weapons used, took place on the Brown Brothers' plantation near Bonus, Monday night in which Schacafor was killed and Roberson was wounded. The dead negro received five cuts on his face and head, two on his leg, a cut across the right breast and a stab in the heart, that being the fatal wound. The Roberson negro was cut on the forehead across the face. The wound in the face severed a facial artery from which the negro came near bleeding to death. While in the office of Drs. Robinson & Bate Tuesday morning for medical treatment, Roberson stated to a HEADLIGHT reporter that he did not know what was the cause of the trouble, and that he had never had any previous trouble with the dead negro. He stated that he was at his home and heard the dogs barking out in the yard and went out to see what they were barking at, and saw the form of a man near the house. He states that the man ran off a few steps, pulled and opened his knife, turned quickly and began cutting him. Roberson did not learn of the death of his antagonist until so informed by a telephoned message from Bonus while he was in the doctors' office Tuesday morning. He was very weak from the loss of blood and fainted while in the office. It is said that both negroes bore a good reputation in the Bonus community.
