There were, it seems, a year ago, 133 state banks in Texas. Those banks at that time made sworn reports under the call of the then banking commissioner. The same banks made reports only the other day under the direction of Commissioner Love. A comparison of these reports is significant and striking. Those banks have an average of 50 per cent greater resources now than then. Their assets are 50 per cent larger than a brief year ago.
Pretty fine showing, is it not? Those banks do not coin money. They make it by honest toil, by legitimate effort. They could not do it if the country was other than prosperous.
Trade is brisk. Money is sought for investment. The banks make loans, and the loans bring to the banks interest. Those borrowing invest the amounts borrowed. The money invested pays the investors. Having prospered by investing the money borrowed, the borrowers repay the money with interest, so both the bank and the borrower profit by it, and prosper, and thus it is that the prosperity of the banks attest the prosperity of the borrower, and likewise, the general prosperity of the country.
While there were only 133 state banks in Texas last year, this time there are now nearly 300 state banks. They are being organized about the ratio of 15
