Columbus, Tex., October 16.—The final account of the administrators of the William Duvont estate was presented for approval in the probate court this morning by the attorneys of the joint administrators, H. R. Byars and J. A. Robertson.

Miss Adella Duvont, sister of the late Captain William Duvont, had filed and read to the court a protest against the approval of the final account, in which she made objections on twenty-seven counts. The attorneys for the administrators made a general denial of the statements contained therein and entered a demurrer. The court ordered the objections filed by Miss Duvont stricken from the court records and approved the final account. Miss Duvont gave formal notice of appeal from the ruling of the probate judge and stated that she would institute suit against the administrators and their surety.
