BITTEN BY A RATTLER.

Mr. Newton, Bitten on Hand Yesterday, "Is in Precarious Condition."

Mr. Newton, the old fisherman at the river, was bitten on the hand by a rattlesnake yesterday morning about eight o'clock and is in a very precarious condition. The old fellow was out in the bottoms about seven miles from town when bitten. He put his hand into a hollow log into which rats had been carrying pecans. The snake was in the hollow log bit him. About an hour after he had been bitten by the snake, the old fisherman was seen staggering in the road and vomiting, by a negro who was driving a wagon, and leaving the circumstances, the negro placed the old man in the wagon and hurried on to town, reaching here about half past ten o'clock yesterday. He was unconscious when he reached here and his hand and arm were turning blue and were swelling rapidly. He was carried to Dr. Howard Fitzgerald's office and the doctor began to work on him. In an hour's time Dr. Fitzgerald had removed all the swelling and at intervals yesterday evening the old fellow would regain consciousness. Dr. Fitzgerald stated that the old man was in a dangerous condition and would likely not recover from the poisonous reptile's bite. Mr. Newton is an old man who has been fishing out on the Colorado river for some time, and until recently had a large tumor on the back of his neck, same having been removed by Drs. Robinson & Foote of this city a few months ago.
