



He is this year buying rice for four different mills in Louisiana, and is familiar with the rice conditions of that state. He tells us that conditions there are just about the same as here, about 60 per cent of the crop having been marketed and yet quite a lot of rice remaining in the fields, which, like here, are too wet to allow harvesting.
