

**THE SCHEDULE**

**Statement of Assets and Liabilities of Vineyard Walker & Co. Bank.**

The statement issued by the Vineyard, Walker & Co. bank is given on the first page. In connection with same the following is taken from the Houston Post of Thursday:

The first meeting of the creditors of these bankrupts has been called for Saturday, December 7. It will be held by Judge Borden at 10 o'clock a. m. in the room at the corner of Main and Second streets.

The creditors of these bankrupts in order to participate in the first meeting will have to file their claims with the referee before the date set for the meeting to be held. Judge Borden has stated that claims may be mailed in to him and in that way much trouble and expense will be avoided by the interested parties.

**LIST OF LARGEST CREDITORS.**  
A list of the largest creditors of the bank holding security for the amounts due them is as follows:

**THE LARGEST DEPOSITORS.**  
There were about 250 depositors in the bank, and among some of those who had large amounts on deposit were the following: John H. Carter, \$5154.66; Cotora do Valley Rice Milling company, Bay City, \$27,148.96; Eagle Lake Irrigation company, \$4279.26; Eagle Lake Rice Milling company, \$9457.18; C. Hahn, El Campo, \$11,086.94; John Linderholm, Chesterville, \$6535.56; Ed. Reiter, Nottawa, \$4616.51; Q. F. Walker estate, \$4244.85 and \$1076.19; and T. A. Wood, \$3740.10.

The bank owns unsecured notes as follows: Captain J. A. Robertson, Galveston, \$20,000; City National bank of San Antonio, \$7000; and Woods National bank of San Antonio, \$10,000; and owes to different banks on various accounts as follows: National bank of Commerce, \$1942.85; National City bank, Houston, \$425.00; First National bank of Houston, \$226.43; Woods National

bank of San Antonio, \$4514.51, and G. C. Sanford & Co., Wharton, \$116.00.

The assets of the bank consist primarily of real estate, notes, stock and bonds and accounts. It owns real estate to the value of \$31,825 and holds notes against the following: Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation company, \$47,000; Water, Light and Gin company, \$10,000; Lakeside Rice Milling Company, \$35,000; Colorado Valley Rice Milling company, \$42,000.

**BONDS AND STOCK OWNED.**  
The bank owns stock in incorporated companies and negotiable bonds in incorporated companies as follows: Eagle Lake

Rice Irrigation company, 200 bonds of the face value of \$500 each; First National bank of Eagle Lake, 170 shares of capital stock of \$125 each; International Coal Mines company of San Antonio, 100 shares of \$100 each; Eagle Lake Rice Milling company, ten shares of capital stock of \$100 each and twenty-three shares of the capital stock of \$100 each.

The individual schedule of Benjamin L. Vineyard shows that he owns considerable lands and stocks. Among the stocks owned by him are as follows: 4984 shares of the capital stock of the Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation company of \$50 per share; fifty shares of Frank Stephens company of Eagle Lake of value \$140 per share; one-sixth of capital stock of Fidelity Immigration company; forty shares of Alamo Beach Investment company of Eagle Lake; ninety-four shares of capital stock of Lakeside Rice Milling company; eight shares of the capital stock of Gulf States Life Insurance company of Houston; seventeen shares of capital stock of Colorado Valley Rice Milling company; ten shares of Pritchard Rice Milling company; thirty-five shares of capital stock of Water, Light and Gin company of Eagle Lake; ninety-two shares of capital stock of Colorado Valley Rice Milling company; eleven shares of the capital stock of the First National bank of Eagle Lake. Mr. Vineyard carries life insurance to the amount of \$31,000.

The individual schedule of Robert Earl Walker shows that he owns considerable real estate in his own name. He carries life insurance to the amount of \$52,000.

The individual inventory of Andrew M. Waugh shows that he owns a large amount of land and considerable stock in companies in which Mr. Vineyard is interested. He carries life insurance to the amount of \$61,000.

The individual schedules of Leo V. Hahn and Peter Hahn show that they own considerable real estate and some stocks.

Max Taub, one of the receivers for Vineyard, Walker & Co., who returned yesterday from Eagle Lake, takes a most optimistic view of the situation. Mr. Taub believes that the business will be able to pay out without loss to the creditors of the company

"One thing that impresses me," said he yesterday, "is the confidence of the people of Eagle Lake in the members of the firm and belief that there will be no loss. They realize that Captain B. L. Vineyard, senior member of the firm, has been largely responsible for the upbuilding of that section, an appreciation which has much to do with the faith of the people in him and the firm."
