



Glidden, Tex., Nov. 25.—The Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway Company is to erect a building here soon for a new hotel. It will be a large structure, and will accommodate many people and others who see fit to stop over in our small city. Pissenger trains will stop here for lunch, which will cause a few hundred people to patronize the hotel every few days. This being a terminal causes all trainmen to lay over here several hours each trip they make. Heretofore the Brown News Company has been operating all eating houses here, and will discontinue business as soon as the new hotel is ready for business. Mr. Alvin Anderson of the general mercantile firm of Anderson & Finnick will be manager, and expects to have nothing but that which will be to the interest of his customers. There will be no negro cooks, but a clean hotel from start to finish.

Beeville, Tex., Nov. 25.—A number of citizens of this place were taken in on a Bible proposition by a well dressed and clerical looking stranger. Calling at a house while the head of the family was absent, he requested permission to leave a copy of the Bible to be inspected and purchased if desired. Of course, there was the little formality of a receipt for the book to be signed by the lady of the house that the agent might turn into his "house" just to show where the book was left. The receipt, however, turned out to be a thirty-day note, which was discounted at one of the local banks and which had to be paid when due.

Smithville, Tex., Nov. 24.—The Katy depot, dining hall and division headquarters office building here caught fire about 1:30 o'clock this morning and burned to the ground. E. B. Kinney of St. Louis, who was employed as cook, perishing in the flames. The loss is estimated at \$10,000. insured. The fire originated in the kitchen of the dining department. The records of the superintendent's office were lost and the dispatchers on duty barely escaped.

The boys, as usual, began to disturb the performers. This thing happens at almost every show that comes to Eagle Lake and the people are getting mighty tired of it. Mr. John Garrison and Miss Mattie Wallace were quietly married at the Methodist parsonage in East Bernard by Rev. Hensch last Sunday night. Mr. Garrison is the popular young pumper for the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway at that place, and the bride is the beautiful and accomplished young daughter of Mr. J. A. Wallace, a prominent rice farmer of that community.

A fire of something out of the ordinary occurred here Tuesday afternoon about 3 o'clock when a Santa Fe engine, number 98, caught on fire. The fire company responded within five minutes. The cab was blistered and considerably scorched though otherwise no damage was done. The citizens here have been expressing their disapproval rather freely that the engine should have been run into the heart of town after it was on fire, for had the fire not been put out an explosion might have occurred, costing many lives and much damage to property. The fire originated from a leak in the oil tank.

Mr. J. W. Reese has purchased from Mr. Thomas Boulden the old brick livery stable property on Spring street, where, as soon as possible, he proposes to open a livery, feed and sale stable. He is having much substantial work done on the building, and has received the bill of lading from an Indiana factory for a congress of swed rigs. A number of horses are now on hand, some of which he offers for sale. Walter says he does not mean to crowd things, but that he believes there is always room for one more. Austin, Tex., Nov. 20.—Commissioner of Agriculture Miller today said: "I notice in the last issue of the Financial Age, a journal devoted to the interests of the New York financiers, the following harsh comment on the South's position pertaining to the holding of cotton: 'In a recent issue we took occasion to gently chide the South for its parsimonious conduct in relation to its cotton. Just at a time when the outflowing stream of this great and useful staple would release to us millions of dollars of foreign gold that would relieve the domestic stringency, the South persists in playing a holdup game.' The South could answer by chiding the financiers of the North for holding on to their gilt-edged bonds and other first-class securities during this time of great need. If our friends of the North are sincere in desiring immediate relief, let them place these securities on the market. Europe would gladly take them, paying gold for the same, and thus the stringency would be relieved. Why should the South sacrifice its cotton to relieve a stringency created by a lot of Wall Street gamblers, who seem to care no more about the general welfare of the country than a trout does for a minnow? Is it not a fact that a coterie of cotton speculators, headed by Mr. Theodore Price, have been caught short a few hundred thousand bales, and, unless the farmers turn loose at once, those men will be compelled to enter the spot market, paying a higher price than they expected when they made their contracts? It looks like the time is rapidly approaching when the spinners will be compelled to buy cotton, and the wail of Mr. Price in his confidential circular is suggestive."

The annual report of the Pasteur Institute at Austin gives 301 cases treated, with none developing hydrophobia. 229 were indigent treated free of cost, 62 paid a fee of \$25 each. The Flatonia Argus however, last week announced the death from hydrophobia, of a boy in Flatonia who had been dismissed from the institute, as cured six weeks ago.

The state of Oklahoma, which was admitted to the union on Saturday last, is the first democratic state to come into the union in sixty-two years, or since Texas was admitted. It will have a greater voting strength in congress and in presidential elections because of the fact that it is the largest state in population ever admitted to the union. With the two democratic senators from Oklahoma, the democrats will again have one more vote than the one-third necessary, and, if united, the party will have an unlimited veto power in the consideration of treaties. Although entitled by its population to seven members of the lower house, Oklahoma will have but one of those five members four are democrats and one is a republican.—La Grange Journal.

The Eagle Lake Rice Irrigation Company has been placed in the hands of a receiver, W. F. B. Wicker of this city being named by the court to officiate in this capacity. Suit for the recovery of a debt amounting to about \$2000 and for the appointment of the receiver was filed in the district court at Houston by the Frank Stephens Company.

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
