BANK IS SOLVENT.

First National Bank Will Re-open For Business In a Few Days.

SITUATION LOOKS BRIGHTER

Things in General Are Looking Brighter in Eagle Lake and Business Getting Better.

While nothing official has been given out for publication, it is generally talked on the streets here that the First National Bank of this city which failed to open its doors and suspended business today three weeks ago on account of the stringency in the money market, has been declared perfectly solvent after a thorough examination of its affairs by National Bank Examiner J. W. Hertford of Galveston.

Since the closing of this bank, the day after the Vineyard, Walker & Company bank filed its petition in bankruptcy in the Federal Court at Houston, its affairs have been in the hands of the National Bank Examiner.

The stockholders of this bank have this week been circulating papers among the depositors of the institution getting them to sign that they will leave their money now in the bank on deposit for a certain length of time—the time in most cases being from three to six months.

This agreement has been signed by most of all the depositors. The stockholders have taken this step to prevent a run when the bank again reopens for business, should such a course be pursued by the depositors.

The financial situation in Eagle Lake is beginning to look brighter. With the assurance of the reopening of the First National Bank, the business men and the people generally are in much better spirits. Business has begun to pick up a little and we trust that things will soon reach a normal condition in a business way.
