BANK RE-OPENED

First National Reopened For Business Thursday With Lots of Money on Hand.

National Bank Examiner J. W. Hertford who has been in charge of the First National Bank since it closed its doors on November 9th, turned over the affairs of that banking institution Thursday to the directors and at a

clock bank's doors were re-opened for business. No change has been made in local officers, Mr. Fox Stephens remaining as cashier and Mr. T. W. Shugart as assistant cashier, and the only change in directors is caused by the resignation of B. L. Vineyard and A. M. Waugh, whose places are being filled by J. B. Stewart and Frank Stephens. The bank began doing business promptly at 2 o'clock, since which hour very few people have withdrawn money and the bank gained in deposits on its opening day to the amount of over \$10,000.00, the actual cash withdrawals amounting to less than a hundred dollars.

The statement issued by the bank Thursday shows cash on hand and in transit from the United States treasurer to the amount of \$61,000.00.

Bank Examiner Hertford stated that the affairs of the First National Bank were in better shape now than ever. The statement of this bank which is published elsewhere in this paper gives the bank a most flattering showing, and the manner in which people were making deposits on the opening day and since shows the confidence in which the bank and those connected with it are held.

The re-opening of the First National Bank has given new life to Eagle Lake. The people are glad that it is again open for business, the people in general are in better spirits and business will pick up considerably.

The bank opened without a limit as to withdrawals.

At about half past three o'clock Wednesday afternoon an alarm of fire was turned in, the occasion being a small blaze on the roof of Mr. Garmon's restaurant building, which is thought to have caught from a spark from the flue. The fire company was soon on hand ready for action but the blaze had already been extinguished. It doesn't take but a short time for our fire boys to get to a fire, day or night, and they do good work after they get there, too. Eagle Lake is proud of her fire company.
