Properties of Lemons.
The hygienic properties of
lemons which contain citric acid
have been well known for many
years, but it is only lately that
scientists discovered the acid
was powerful enough to kill the
germ of typhoid fever in twenty-
four hours. Some typhoid fever
bacteria, treated with raw lemon
juice and placed in the sunshine,
were killed in two hours, the
sunshine proving a quick agent
in connection with the medicinal
properties of the fruit. Lemons
have been found beneficial in the
worst forms of smallpox and
cholera, so it is well to know the
medicinal properties of a harm-
less yet powerful fruit acid.
