A Proclamation for the Election of City Officers.

In obedience to an order of the City Council, made and entered on the minutes of said Council, and by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Eagle Lake, Texas, I do hereby order and proclaim that a municipal election will be held within the corporate limits of said City, on the 17th day of April, 1908, same being the second Tuesday in said month, in the public square in said City, weather permitting; if not, then in the City Council hall of said City, for the purpose of electing the Mayor and the following term of two years, to succeed W. S. Strickland, now filling the unexpired term of J. C. Reister, whose term of office will have expired by said time.

A City Marshal for the ensuing term of two years, to succeed Abe Beakes, now filling the unexpired term of R. T. Westmoreland, whose term will have expired by said date.

And two Aldermen to succeed W. E. Welford and J. E. Roberts, whose terms of office will have expired by said date.

I hereby appoint T. J. Roberts previously named, to fill the position of necessary associate judges and clerks.

Done at the Mayor's office in said City on this 14th day of March, 1908.

Mr. W. T. Eldridge is to assume the management of the great Cunningham plantation at Sugarland. Contracts have been signed and all arrangements made by which he takes control of the 13,000 acres of the property of the Cunningham Sugar company, and one of the finest and best equipped mills and refineries in the South. He will have direct control of interests to the aggregate value of \$1,500,000. Reports that the plantation had been purchased by Mr. Eldridge have been denied, and the conditions under which he is to operate the vast property explained. A large block of stock in the company owning the plantation is held by the Lincoln Trust Co. of St. Louis. Mr. Eldridge was formerly associated in the management of the large mill near Eagle Lake. Later, joined with a number of other capitalists and planters, he purchased the Ellis plantation and operated it, after many improvements had been made, until it was sold to the state.—Houston Chronicle.

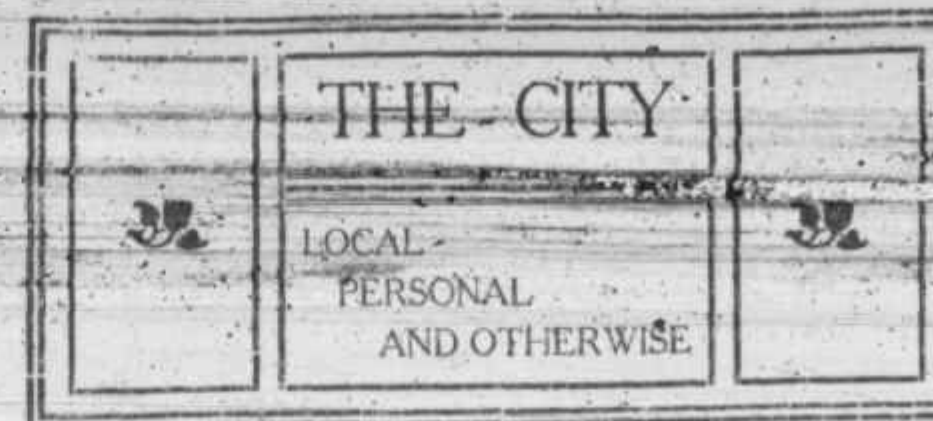
