Ben J. Brothers of Quanah has just purchased from Houston parties 240 lots in the heart of Quanah, on the Fort Worth and Denver railroad, at an average cost of \$30 a lot. The lots were bought from John F. Callaway of Houston. They are unimproved, although improvements are all about them, and Mr. Brothers is enthusiastic over his trade. He says that the new \$15,000 school building is on an adjoining block to the property he has purchased, and that Quanah has not even heard about the panic, but that her prosperity has steadily increased. He says that 12 brick buildings, 300 residences and a new court house have been erected in the Banhandle town in the past twelve months.

BAILEY CLUB ORGANIZED.

Eagle Lake Supporters of Bailey Organized Club.
The supporters of Senator Bailey in Eagle Lake met at the Vineyard, Walker & Co. bank Thursday night and organized a "Bailey Club," with Dr. F. O. Norris chairman and J. E. Roberts secretary. Dr. Norris stated that the object of the meeting was to elect men friendly to Bailey to go to the Fort Worth meeting for selection of delegates to the National Convention at Denver. After being elected permanent chairman Dr. Norris made a short talk praising Bailey and thanking the members present for tuncion bestowed upon him.

J. J. Raezer, W. A. Dallas and M. E. Gwynn were appointed as a committee to draw up resolutions. This committee retired to another room and drew up the following resolutions which were adopted by the club:

"Whereas, the enemies of Senator J. W. Bailey are making a concerted effort to defeat him in his race before the people of Texas for one of the positions as delegate to the approaching Democratic National convention hoping thereby to so humiliate him as to cause his resignation as U. S. Senator and, Whereas, we believe such action is undemocratic and calculated to harm him; lessen his influence and weaken the democratic party of whose principles he is such an able exponent and defender,

Therefore, be it resolved by the J. W. Bailey democratic club of Eagle Lake, Texas, that we condemn in no uncertain terms the efforts of those who seek to defeat Senator Bailey and thus humiliate him.
Be it further resolved that this club endorse his course in the U. S. Senate and pledges its efforts to assist him in his election as one of the delegates to the National democratic convention.

Be it further resolved that five delegates be sent to the Bailey convention in Fort Worth on the 28th of March and that they be instructed to assist in bringing about ways and means for his election as delegate to the National democratic convention.
The delegates appointed were J. J. Raezer, Dr. F. O. Norris, G. W. Keith, J. W. Thatcher and Emanuel Ross.

Mr. Ross, who was a member of the 30th legislature from Fayette county, was called on for a talk. Mr. Ross responded, giving

ing a review of the Bailey investigation at Austin, from a Bailey standpoint along the same lines as published in the Bailey papers.

Mr. Ross upheld Bailey in his bitter speech at Austin after his "exoneration." The chairman was also called upon for a talk. He advised against foolish disputation of this matter, urging that there is no use for neighbors and friends to fall out over the Bailey matter. His talk was along the lines of keeping down friction and advised that this should not be made a personal matter. The doctor, however admitted that Bailey was not perfect but stated that if he wanted to pick out honest men he would not go to those who are "keeping up the howl about Bailey."

M. C. Yates read the list of Bailey supporters in Eagle Lake, showing the number to be seventy-nine.

About forty people were present at the meeting and among them were a number of anti-Bailey men who had attended out of mere curiosity.

The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.
