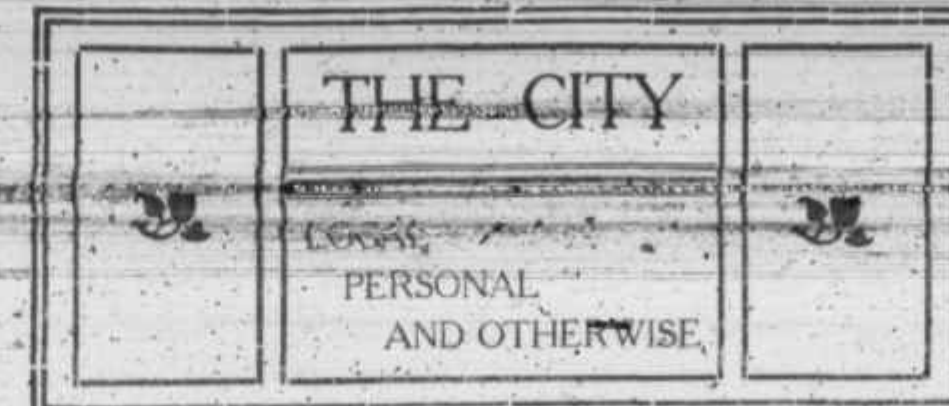

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To the Public. In obedience, to the request of the Health Officer of the State of Texas, for the purpose of prevention of disease, and in obedience to the request of the Board of Health of Eagle Lake, the City Council of the City of Eagle Lake, made and caused to be entered on the minutes of said council, directing the City Health Officer and the Mayor of said city, to order and request the citizens of Eagle Lake, and the Street Commissioners, to clean and have cleaned, their premises and the streets and alleys of said city, by and not later than the 15th day of April 1908 and to maintain the same in said clean condition.

Now therefore in obedience to above, the City Health Officer and Mayor of said city by virtue of the authority vested in us, under the law do hereby request each and every citizen of Eagle Lake, within the corporate limits thereof, to clean up and put in a good sanitary condition, their respective premises and places of abode, and street commissioners, to clean up and put in a good sanitary condition, the streets and alleys of said city, by and not later than the 15th day of April 1908, and to maintain said premises, places of abode, streets and alleys in said condition.

And hereby give notice that the sanitary ordinances of said city shall and will be strictly enforced from and after said date, and you are respectfully notified that any person not heeding the above request, will be subject to the penalties prescribed by the ordinances of said city.

Done at the offices of the Mayor and the City Health Officer this 24th day of March 1908.

Death of an Honest New Yorker.

When an honest man dies in New York he gets hardly a three line notice in the newspapers.

This was the case with William H. S. Wood, who has been called home after a long and useful life. For half a century he was connected with the Bowery Savings Bank, most of the time as president. At the time of his death the deposits aggregated over \$100,000,000. There are only three banks in the United States whose deposits exceed this amount. He left only a modest competence. He was not long to the modern school of financiers, but he held that the first duty of a banker is to honestly take care of the money entrusted to his hands. He refused to pay \$20,000 bribe money to certain members of the New York legislature when such bribery would have saved his bank three or four times that sum annually. He said that the savings banks of the state represent the majority of the voters. So do the members of the legislature. If the legislature is false to its trust it is no reason why it should be. One would suppose that the life of such a man would be held up as an example in this era of insurance swindlers, speculations and high finance. But no one in New York seemed to think that the death of Mr. Wood either pointed a moral or adorned a tale.—Patria Star.

Hollandaise Sauce. This is really a warm mayonnaise, using butter instead of olive oil. It is the best sauce for serving with salmon or other boiled fish if you desire it hot. It requires a quarter pound butter, half a lemon, the yolks of two eggs, a little salt and a half teaspoonful of white pepper. The secret of its successful making is to preserve an even temperature. The sauce should not approach the boiling point, as the eggs would cook, and the sauce curdle. Put the eggs in a small saucepan and add the butter, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon. It will soon thicken like a mayonnaise. When the butter is all in, add salt and pepper, and lastly the lemon juice, stirring until well mixed. If the sauce becomes too thick add a little stock or hot water. Surround the fish with parsley and slices of lemon and serve the sauce in a bowl. A few sliced cucumbers should be served with fish.
