White Man's Primary Election Rules.

At a meeting of the central committee of the white man's party, held in Columbus, Texas, March 28, 1908, the following business was transacted:

The following presiding officers of election were appointed to hold the election in their respective precincts Saturday, May 2, 1908:

No. 1, Columbus, Leon F. Dick; No. 2, Altair, Harry Walker; No. 3, Garwood, Gregor Rott; No. 4, Rock Island, J. M. Nix; No. 5, Oakland, A. Strunk; No. 6, Wadsworth, J. T. Walker; No. 7, Jordan, Geo. Hays; No. 8, Houston, Robert Davis; No. 9, Shaw's Bend, Joe Wilson; No. 10, Santa Anna, H. B. Beane; No. 11, Bushy, A. H. Lamm; No. 12, Springdale, F. A. Lazo; No. 13, Smith, Joe Braden; No. 14, Bonham, Arnold Payne; No. 15, Abilene, A. J. Gillispie; No. 16, Eagle Lake, W. V. Boyd.

It was ordered that the following rules, as adopted by the county convention of the white man's party, and by the central committee, shall govern in the white man's primary election on May 2nd, 1908:

1. That a primary election for the purpose of selecting candidates for the various county and precinct officers of Colorado county, is ordered to be held in each election precinct of said county on the 2nd day of May, 1908.
2. That said election shall be held under the direction of the white man's party and at which the central committee of the white man's party shall prepare the official ballot to be used.

said county, qualified under the constitution and laws of Texas to vote, shall vote. Each voter at said election shall be required to exhibit receipt showing payment of poll tax before February 1, 1908, for the year 1907, or to make affidavit that he is exempt from the payment of poll tax provided that all persons who became 21 years of age after January 1, 1907, or who will become 21 years of age before the day of the general election to be held in November, 1908, and who are otherwise qualified, as hereinbefore provided, shall be entitled to vote at said primary election without exhibiting tax receipts, provided further, that before receiving any ballot, the presiding officer shall cause the voter to pledge, himself that he will support the nominees of the white man's party, as determined by this election.

3. The polls at said primary election shall be opened at 8 o'clock a.m. and closed at 6 p.m.

4. The presiding officer of election shall appoint two judges of election and as many clerks as he may deem necessary to assist him in holding said election; and no ballot shall be counted until the polls have closed.

5. All officers of said election shall, before entering upon their duties as such officers, take an oath that they will faithfully and impartially conduct the said election, which oath shall be administered by the presiding officer to himself and assistants.

6. The central committee of the white man's party shall prepare the official ballot to be used at said primary election, which shall be headed "Official Ballot of the White Man's Primary Election," and shall contain the names of all candidates to be voted for at said election; and the officers for which they are candidates, and shall furnish the same to the presiding officers of each election precinct; and no other ballot or vote shall be counted except the official ballot above provided for. The said ballot shall also have thereon a blank left for the name of the precinct chairman for each precinct, as provided by the executive committee.

7. That the officers holding said election shall retain at all times during said day, sufficient election tickets to accommodate the voters who have not voted at such time and that none of said tickets shall be distributed by such officers before the day of election.

8. That immediately after the polls are closed the election officers shall proceed to count the ballots, and when said count is completed shall forthwith make returns of said election to Geo. Best, chairman of the white man's party, at Columbus, who returns shall consist of the poll lists, tally lists, with a list showing the total number of votes cast for each candidate, which tally sheets and lists shall be signed and certified to by the officers of said election; together with the ballots cast in the ballot box, and returned as above directed.

The presiding officers are requested to call on the county clerk for the ballot boxes of their respective precincts, and upon

The central committee also adopted the following:

RULES FOR CANDIDATES:

1. That before a candidate shall be entitled to have his name placed upon the ticket of the white man's party, he shall sign the following pledge: "THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF COLORADO, I, _____, do hereby pledge myself, upon honor as a man and gentleman, that should I be selected for the nomination of said position at said election, I shall not further be a candidate for, nor shall I accept said position, or any other county or precinct office to be filled in November, 1908, and further, that I will support the nominees of the said primary election."
2. That at the time any candidate makes application to have his name placed upon said ticket, if he seeks a county office he shall pay to Hugh R. Brown, secretary, or W. H. Schultz, the treasurer of the central committee, five dollars; and if he seeks a precinct office two dollars and a half, which money shall be given in writing, check, note, and other evidence of said election.
3. That all persons desiring to be nominated of said white man's party shall present their names, in the manner hereinafter provided, to the Secretary, Brown or Treasurer, Schultz, of the central committee, on or before the 20th day of April, 1908, not later than 5 p.m. on said 20th day of April, 1908; and the committee shall not receive the application of any person as a candidate, nor place such person's name upon the ticket of said white man's party, who fails to make such application within the time stated.

A special run Houston to the San Antonio Express says: "It is understood here that W. T. Eldridge of San Antonio, having acquired the Sugarland Railroad, will extend both lines so that he will have a continuous road from a point on the Gulf to a connection with the Houston & Texas Central at Hempstead. It is learned that the construction work will be started shortly. Mr. Eldridge's plan is said to be to merge the Sugarland and Imperial Valley Railroads. He will extend the Sugarland Railroad about fifteen miles from Sugarland to a connection with the San Antonio & Arkansas Pass at Simonton. And the Sugarland Railroad will also be extended from either Arcola, where it connects with the Columbia division of the International & Great Northern, or Duke, where it has Santa Fe connection, to a point on the coast which is yet to be determined. The Imperial Valley's construction will be pushed forward from Sacramento to Brownsville, where it will connect with the Katy. And then to Hempstead with the Central."

COLUMBUS, TEXAS, March 31. Mrs. Jennie Baker, widow of the late Ben M. Baker, today sold the plant and business of the Colorado Citizen to Irving G. Stafford of San Antonio. The paper was established by J. D. Baker, Ben M. Baker and A. H. Baker, three brothers, in March, 1897. Until the breaking out of the war between the States the Citizen strove to preserve the Union of the States. During 1890 it carried an emblem of the American eagle and Union States flags with a motto "The Union and the constitution. The Union it must be preserved." When the call to arms was made all three brothers joined the Confederate forces and two fell fighting. When established it was the only paper in Texas west of the Brazos. It carried advertisements of the principal merchants in Houston and Galveston, and a frequent feature of old copies was advertisement of auction sales of negro slaves.

Mr. Stafford will change the paper from a four-page, eight-column, to a six-column quarto. He will put in a new press with a gasoline engine and equip a very elaborate job department.
