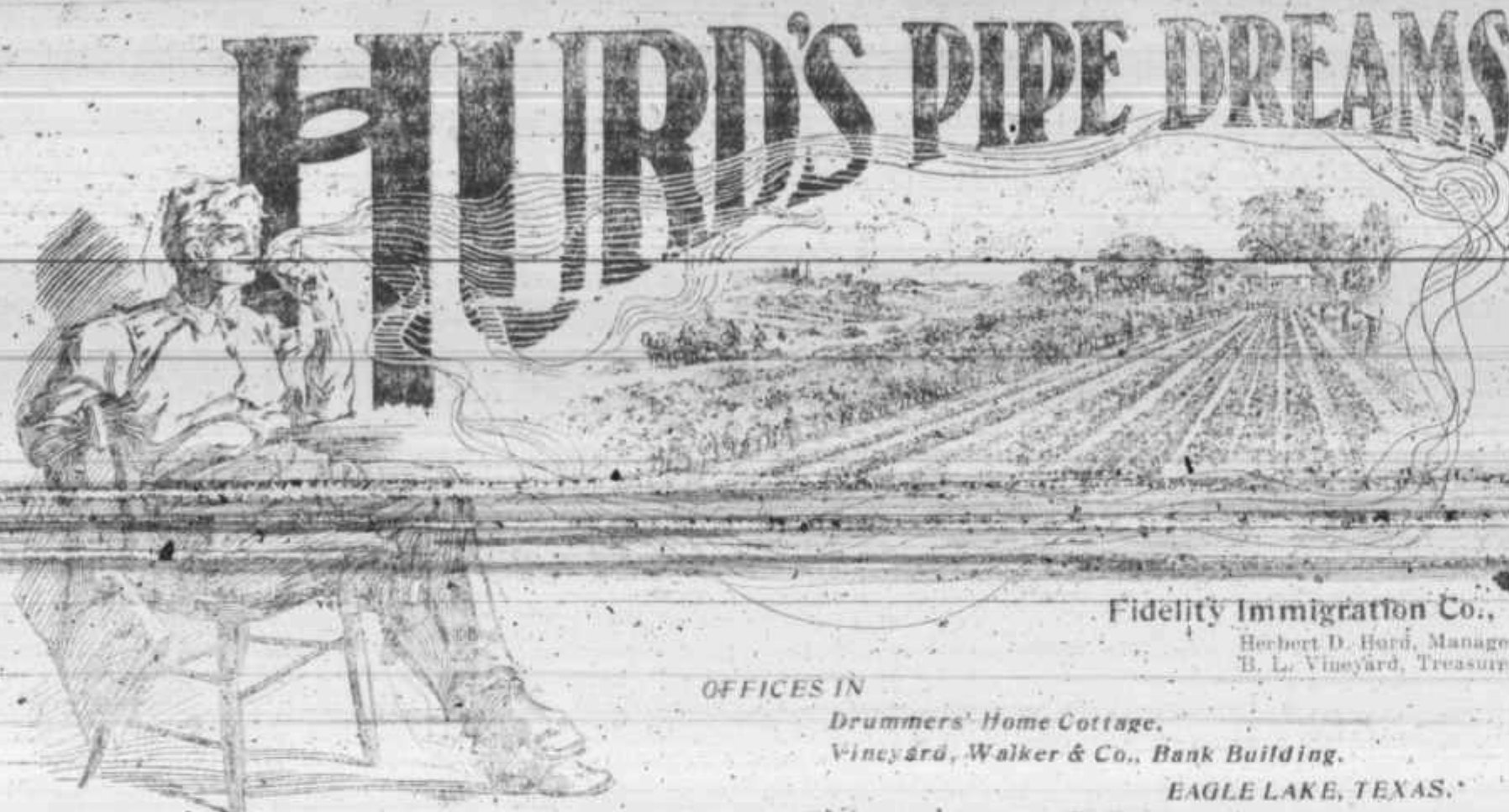

THE HEADLIGHT has received a copy of the official Record of Robert Vance Davidson, Attorney at Law, from Jan. 1, 1905, to March 1, 1907.

He with his assistants under his immediate supervision, has prosecuted as defendants 504 cases in the district courts of Texas; 145 in the courts of Civil Appeals; 145 in the Supreme Courts of Texas; 19 in United States Circuit Courts; 2 in United States Circuit Court of Appeals, and 16 in the United States Supreme Court. Cases against Railroad companies, not including mandamus suits, are 412. Many suits are still pending.

TO THE DEMOCRATS OF TEXAS.
I deem it proper to submit for your scrutiny and consideration at this time, as a record of my stewardship; the following brief statement of the work which has been done by myself and by assistants under my immediate personal supervision since I entered upon the discharge of the duties of the high and responsible office of Attorney General of Texas.

The record thus presented is one of which I may modestly say, I feel proud.
The ordinary routine work of the Department is quite exacting in its character and extent.

It is a well known fact that the Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth Legislatures placed upon the statute books more constructive legislation than any other two legislatures in the State.

As a consequence there has arisen from all quarters an unprecedented demand upon the Attorney General's Department for opinions constraining the law thus enacted, and this Department has also been confronted with an unparalleled volume of litigation in the courts involving many complex and intricate questions as to the constitutionality and proper construction of many of these statutes. Such litigation has covered a very extensive field in addition to the laws enacted by the last two legislatures.

Promptly, carefully, without fear or favor, and upon my judgment as a public officer and trusted servant of the people of Texas, these and many other laws have been construed in hundreds of written opinions which have been given to the Governor, the heads of various executive departments and equisymony institutions of the State government, and district, county, precinct and city officers throughout the State.

This portion of work of the Department has been most laborious and exacting, calling for law providing for taxing inland

diligent and extensive research by night as well as by day, and for the constant exercise of delicate and mature judgment.

I am gratified to be able to say that acquiescence has generally been given to such opinions, and that with few exceptions, they have been approved by the court whenever tested.

Many cases in the District Courts, the Court of Civil Appeals, the Supreme Court, and Federal Courts, presenting questions of franchise with serious interest, and sometimes with momentous consequences to the people of Texas, have been prosecuted or defended, and, as the following record shows, with almost uniform success.

This record is before you; it speaks for itself.
A study of it in detail will show that my administration of the affairs of my office has, from the beginning, been prompt, vigorous, impartial, and, I trust, efficient.

Governor S. W. T. Lanham, in his Biennial Message to the Thirtieth Legislature, in January, 1907, said:

"An extraordinary amount of work and great responsibility have devolved upon the Attorney General. The routine business of his office has been unusually large. The official correspondence, the investigation and approval of bonds, railroad and insurance charters and refund claims, as well as the preparation of opinions and giving advice to the heads of departments and other officers throughout the State, have occupied much of the time of himself and associates and required elaborate research at their hands. In addition to their regular office work they have represented the state in a great number of suits. The litigation involving important public interests has perhaps been greater for the last four years than ever before during the same length of time. Within the last two years there have been pending more than two hundred cases in the State and Federal courts. The matters in controversy have covered a wide range, embracing suits relating to lands, leases, elections, railroad rates, violations of anti-trust laws, public revenues of various kinds, and other miscellaneous subjects. In nearly all the cases that have been finally decided the contention of the State has been sustained. The Fish and Oyster Law, as before stated, has been upheld by the courts. The law levying a tax upon certain individuals, corporations, etc., has been sustained by the District Court and the Court of Civil Appeals. The

State has also been sustained in the Court of Civil Appeals. The law levying a tax upon railroad corporations, measured by their gross receipts, was upheld by the Supreme Court, but it is understood that an appeal will be taken from this judgment to the Supreme Court of the United States. These tax laws passed by the legislature have been resisted on Constitutional and other grounds and the litigation arising therefrom has demanded and received the careful attention of the Attorney General and his able assistants. No department of the government involves more work, harder service and greater responsibility than that of the Attorney General's office. It has been prompt to furnish legal advice to the Governor on all occasions and has been of invaluable assistance to him in the proper determination of many important problems that have confronted him where reliable counsel was needed. During the last two years there have been received and collected through this office from different sources \$24,199.10."

I am fully conscious that, "without haste and without rest," and without regard to personal consequences, or to the assaults of trusts and illegal combinations which have been plundering the people, I have faithfully performed all the varied duties which are imposed upon the Attorney General of Texas by her Constitution and laws.

I have regarded that as the simple measure of my duty in complying with my constitutional oath of office and in demonstrating my appreciation of the exalted trust which the Democracy of Texas has imposed upon me.

Upon a platform of THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE LAW, without fear or favor, I respectfully ask your support of my candidacy for re-election, in order to complete the work which I have undertaken.
