Mrs. O. E. Linderholm and the daughter of Chesterville spent yesterday in the city.

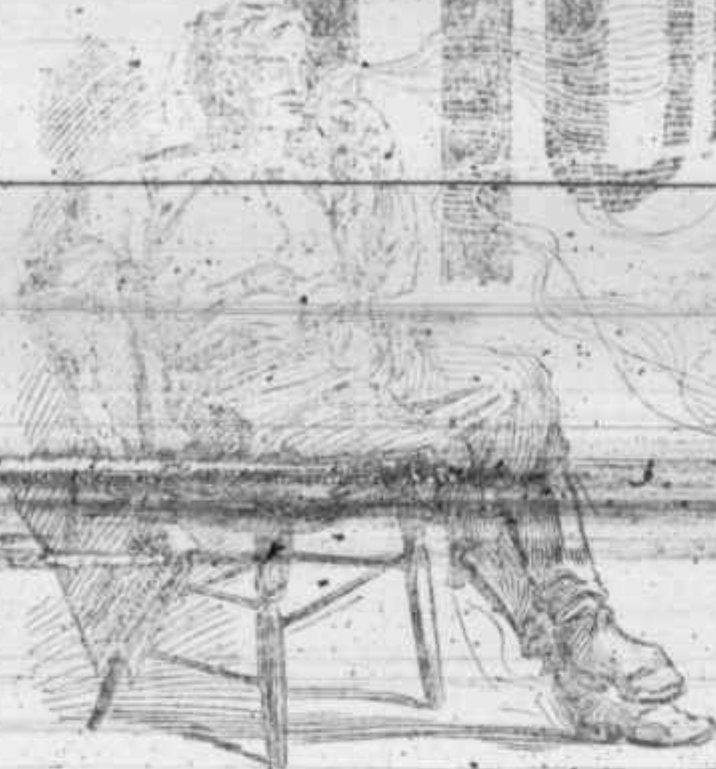
Dr. S. S. Robinson has been spending the week in North Texas as on business. He is expected home today.

Mr. Adkin's Speech.

The anti-Bailey men met at the city park Wednesday night and organized an Anti-Bailey Demo-

cratic Club with Mr. H. W. Carothers chair man and Bruce McCarty secretary. Immediately

after the election of officers, the meeting was declared adjourned, and Mr. Carothers introduced Hon. W. L. Adkins of Columbus, one of the foremost lawyers of our county.

In his introductory remarks, Mr. Carothers said: "He is a man of whom they cannot say he is a disgruntled or disappointed politician, for he has never held office for pay but one time."

Mr. Adkins began his talk at 8:45 o'clock, several hundred people, including a large number of ladies, being present.

Mr. Adkins dealt with the main issues in the campaign against Baileyism, giving facts, every one of which he proved by the record, in a plain, straight, forward and convincing manner.

The speaker was asked quite a number of questions by Bailey men in the audience, and in every instance he had a convincing answer at his tongue's end. He was interrupted so frequently that when he closed his address it was 12 o'clock, though through his entire speech his audience gave him undivided attention. He was interrupted so frequently by questions asked entirely different from what he would be dwelling upon at the time, that it began to be whispered about in the audience that the Bailey men were trying to draw the speaker from the real issues of campaign, though every question Mr. Adkins answered in a strong, convincing, but good natured way.

The speaker was giving his reasons why Joe Bailey should not be sent as a delegate to the National Democratic Convention at Denver when a voice in the audience called out: "Do you want to send Cone Johnson?" "Yes," said Mr. Adkins, "and search Texas over you will not find a purer, cleaner man to represent you." "I know Cone Johnson personally," he continued, "I served in the legislature with him. Cone Johnson is the brainiest man in Texas today. Joe Bailey to the contrary notwithstanding." These remarks brought shouts and applause.

Mr. Adkins' address was applauded liberally and many times during his speech he brought forth shouts and laughter from the audience. He is an eloquent, fluent and forceful speaker, and his address here has done much good for the cause, quite a number of new names having been added to the anti-Bailey list.

It is painful to contemplate the condition of our Congress upon. They are devoting entire ly too much attention to their

business in Washington. They do not seem to have the proper love for their State. Some of them seem inclined to abandon

their duties at Washington, pay their expenses down to Texas, and superintend the work of our state officials. This is all wrong—they are back numbers. They

don't seem to be falling over each other in a mad rush to get into the National Democratic Convention next summer. We

will, however, except Senator Bailey. He is a man after our own heart. He did propose to

take charge of the law suits of Texas against Mr. Pierce, but into the Attorney General's office and boss the Attorney General

and his assistants, and now he is trying to go as a delegate to the National Democratic Convention. This is right and proper. That

convention could be in a deplorable condition if deprived of the presence of his unlimited intellect.
