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A Letter From Mr. Kindred.
Juanajuato Mexico, April 10, '08
Editor HEADLIGHT:

Since the return of Senator Bailey from Washington, it appears that his followers in your city have awakened from their long and deep slumbers, to a life of activity and strenuousness. In your issue of the 4th inst., it seems that the "Bryan, Bailey and Wynne" Club, by resolution, has condemned me for "disobedience of instructions" in the votes I cast against "Baileysism" as representative of Colorado County and in addition, ordered a "suitable reprimand" to be administered.

Whenever, before in all history, did any club attempt to reprimand a man for doing his duty? There is at least one man of that club, who voted for Wagon, the nominee of the republican party against Burgess. I am informed that he is the Eagle Lake correspondent of the Post. It occurs to me that all this "reprimand" is but a mere as there is no Bailey candidate in the field. Why should they condemn me and vote for Allen, who is also Anti? "Disobedience of instructions" in the Bailey matter? No other charges against me, in all the long record of the 30th Legislature! Is it not strange? Is it impossible that I have done no wrong? All will remember the campaign in 1906, and that I was elected on the issue, that no man could serve two masters. Mr. Ayars was employed by the railroads, and at the same time representative of the people. We ever personally friendly, but on the issue, we were at variance, and he was defeated. Knowing all this, I could do nothing for Mr. Bailey's methods, for I was instructed against them. I was sent to represent the interest of the people, not that of Mr. Bailey alone. How well I did the record will show. The "hero-worshippers," those who believe they can serve two masters at the same time, those who do not believe that "public office is a public trust" and those who seek office for what little they can pick up on the outside, as fees and incidentals, to assist the wife and babies in keeping the wolf from the door, together with those who believe that the railroads, insurance companies, trusts and other combinations of capital in restraint of trade should dominate and control the government, perhaps will vote against me, otherwise with the hosts of the honest self-supporting yeomanry, whose toils and hardships serve to build up great nations and maintain their institutions by fighting their battles. While all Texas is stirred from center to circumference over the matter of the election of a few delegates to the Denver convention, we should not forget that there remains a great work to be done by the 25th of July, this year, at which date state and county officers are to be nominated. As the immortal Grant said, "Let us have peace," for we do not know what "bed fellows" we may have the next campaign. On account of the White Man's primary and not wishing to in any way, interfere with the interests of the candidates for county and precinct offices, I thought it proper to defer my canvass until after May 2nd, when I hope to be at home and will have other things to say, which all the people do not know having had no opportunity to investigate the scheme. I have

written this letter for the reason that I am too far away just now, to be heard to say personally, what I have herein related.
