Mr. J. T. Eaton of Rock Island was in the city Thursday.

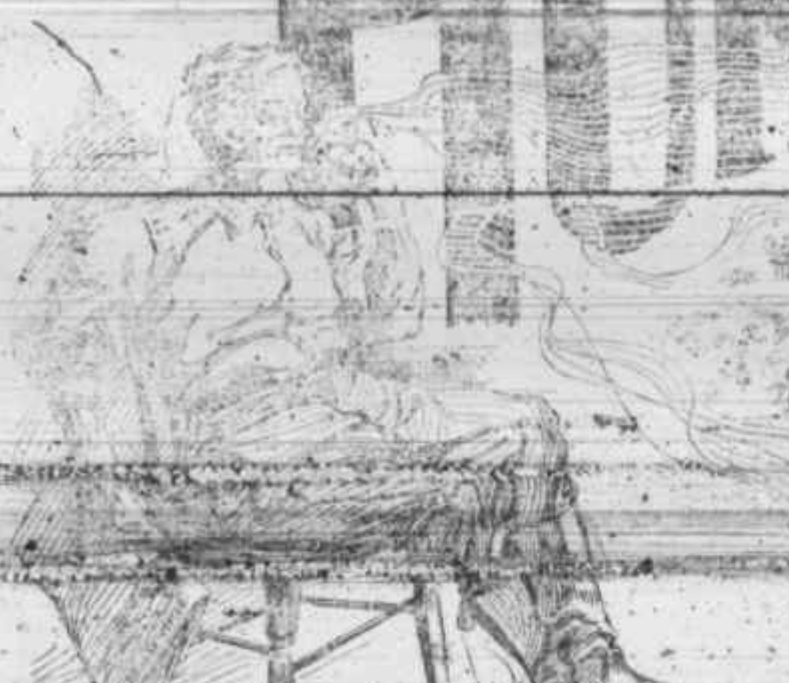
Mr. O. Green came up from Glen Flora Thursday to hear the Wolters-Garrett debate.
