Dear Sir:

We are in receipt of yours of the 20th inst., in which you submit the question as to whether or not it will be necessary for saloons to close on May 2nd, that being the day on which an election is to be held for the selection of delegates at large to the Democratic National Convention. As this election is not provided for by the Terrell Election Law and is not to be held in accordance therewith, but under rules and regulations promulgated by the Democratic Executive Committee, we are inclined to think that it will not be necessary for saloons to close on that day.
