College Station, Tex., May 3. Prof. C. H. Alvord, who is general superintendent of the college dairy, has installed a system of milking machines.

At College Station, Tex., May 3. A cow four teats at a time, each machine being attached to two cows. Four machines can be operated by one man, are thus eight cows on thirty-two teats, where formerly a hired man, or possibly some odd fellow, pulling away with one hand on a single teat. Prof. Alvord states that the machines are proving a distinct success. They milk the cows clean as well as rapidly. One difference worth remark is seen in the fact that the machine-extracted milk stays sweet longer than that extracted by hand.
