Colorado County Convention. Columbus, Texas, August 1.

In the Democratic county convention the following resolutions were adopted:

1. We reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of the democratic party as announced by them.

2. We adopt the platform of the National Democratic party promulgated by the Denver convention, and pledge our allegiance to Bryan and Kern, nominees for president and vice president, respectively, of said convention.

3. We endorse the administration of Governor T. M. Campbell and ask those democrats who are opposed to some of his policies to suspend their judgment thereon until the practicable application thereof can be ascertained.

4. We denounce as "embezzlers of power" those officers who use the influence and power bestowed upon them by the confidence of the people as a business asset for their own use and benefit in securing employment at superlatively large fees by trusts and monopolies in the efforts of the latter to break down and evade the law, which such officers are elected to uphold. And we endorse the administration of Attorney General Robert Vance Davidson, and bid him Godspeed.

5. Whereas article 8 of the constitution provides that taxation shall be equal and uniform, and that all property shall be taxed equal in proportion to its value; and, whereas, under present laws this purpose has not been accomplished, but that some counties are now paying taxes to the State on a basis of a

the act of the Thirtieth legislature, while other counties have failed, and yet fail and refuse to raise their valuation in accordance therewith, whereby such counties are paying a fair less proportion of State and public school taxes than those counties where the valuations have been raised, therefore, be it

Resolved by the democracy of Colorado county in convention assembled, That we favor the amendment of that portion of our present tax laws whereby such gross irregularities are made possible, and the substitution therefor of a law that will better secure uniformity and more equitably distribute the burdens of the State government and public school systems upon the several counties in proportion to their real value, and our delegates to the State convention are instructed to use their best efforts to secure the adoption of a plank to this effect in the State platform.

Thirty delegates were appointed to the State convention, one-fourth of whom favor prohibition and three-fourths are opposed to prohibition. Hon. W. L. Adkins was chairman of the convention.

In his efforts to prevent the commercial and industrial slavery of our people by breaking up such practices and banishing such unlawful trusts, combinations and monopolies from the borders of Texas.

What Davidson Said.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 1.—Attorney General Davidson's utterances last night to forgive and forget were only partially given in the press reports, and they were so unusual, after a bitter campaign, that they are given in full below, and contrast with those of others who have been successful in campaigns in Texas.

In concluding Gen. Davidson, as he stood before the sea of people and facing the capitol, said:

"As I stand here tonight, with only the blue canopy of heaven above us and the stars keeping watch, I feel that I can truly say that I have never been in Texas against me, though I cut deep into my heart and I suffered the torture of an innocent man. The poisoned arrows hurled at me because I discharged my duty faithfully and without fear led to the burial in the earth and I stand before you tonight, calm and victorious. But, my friends, while we are assembled here, let us in this hour of victory, let us remember that there is nothing is grander than to be unanimous. There is nothing in life more delightful than to be the better conflicts that arise, a time among men, there comes a time when passion and prejudice shall slumber. So with a heart full of love and gratitude to all my friends, with hatred and malice to none, I shall take up my official hat and my work again, trusting that the people, through which governs and guides all my hold in the future blessings and prosperity to you and yours, the grand, noble people of Texas."

Contrast Davidson's speech after his vindication by the democratic Texas with the speech of the "Trade" after his whitewash by the both Legislatures. He waited words that would write and his fine soldiers. "Not one of these men shall ever hold office again." They were to be ran in the Gulf. They were to be buried with face downward. Their pictures were to be placed in the regent's gallery, and Bailey's children were to be taught to hate them. From the governor down (and he also unless he "behaved" to suit Bailey) every opponent was doomed to destruction.
