We have a bang-up-to-date wide-awake, progressive, out of debt city with about 2500 inhabitants and the modern residence properties and business blocks now under construction, our citizens catching onto the idea of making cement sidewalks and otherwise beautifying and improving our city.

The population of the towns and rural districts in Colorado county have increased during the past five years approximately 100 per cent. We still have unsettled vast acres of rich valley and prairie land that can be purchased at low prices and on easy terms.

OLD SUNSET ANNUALS.
Colonel Anderson Has Collection Framed in His Office.

Framed in the office of Colonel T. J. Anderson, general passenger agent for the Sunset Central, are three old annual passes of the Sunset lines and a certificate of stock in the original Houston and Brazos railroad was the first step in the building of what is now the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railroad. The stock is made out in favor of James Love and is signed by A. C. Allen and Thomas M. League, as commissioners for Houston.

The first of the passes was issued to Rev. Mr. Eaton and reads good over the Buffalo Bayou, Brazos and Colorado railroad.

Its date is the year 1870 and is signed by G. B. Nichols as superintendent.

The second is an annual, dated 1871, reading, "Good over the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railroad (Sunset route in favor of Woods, Esq.)." It is also in favor of the Rev. Mr. Eaton and G. B. Nichols is still shown as president.

The third is an annual, "Over the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railroad (Sunset route in favor of Woods, Esq.)." It is dated 1877 and is signed by A. W. Dickerson, superintendent—Houston Chronicle.
