Mint Infused Tea.

If a housewife has not tried serving sprigs of mint in glasses of iced tea for luncheon or supper, she wants to experiment with it at once.

It gives a refreshing flavor to the drink. The stems and lower leaves are crushed between the fingers and then dipped into the glass after the crushed ice has been put in.

A glass should be filled with with this crushed ice, which is a far better method than breaking off lumps of ice and letting them swim around in the tea. After the glass is filled, two slices of lemon are slightly crushed on top of the ice, and then boiling hot tea is poured over.

One peck green tomatoes and six large onions sliced and let stand over night in water, in which one-half cup salt has been dissolved. Drain. Then boil in one quart of vinegar and one quart of water for 15 minutes and drain. Add one large head of cabbage sliced fine and one green pepper, two pounds brown sugar, two tablespoons all kinds of spices, one teaspoon mustard, one-quarter teaspoon pepper. Cover with vinegar and boil three hours. This will keep in jar all winter and is very nice.

WEIMAR IS A LIVE TOWN.

Has a Population Which Is Taking Advantage of Opportunities.

Weimar, Texas. Weimar is situated in the western portion of Colorado county, 100 miles west of Houston and 110 miles east of San Antonio, on the Southern Pacific railroad. It is surrounded by a rich agricultural country, composed chiefly of black prairie lands, with some post oak country to the south-east.

Its population is at present about 1800, composed mainly of Americans, Germans and a few Bohemians.

Weimar supports at present one oil mill, four cotton gins, one electric light and water plant, and expects before long to have a creamery. Besides these enterprises Weimar possesses nine general merchandise stores, seven grocery stores, seven saloons, four doctors, three millinery stores, two banks, two barber shops, two furniture stores, two lumber yards, two butcher shops, one dry goods store, one clothing store, one produce store, one printing office, one hardware store, two harness and saddle stores, one bakery, one sausage factory, one restaurant, one livery stable, two drug stores, one dentist, three blacksmith shops, one tin shop.

In the way of schools, Weimar has a \$10,000 public school, which employs a principal and three assistants; one German-American school and one Catholic school.

The Methodist, Baptist, Christian, Lutheran and Catholic denominations are represented here, with beautiful church buildings within the city limits.

Our farmers have just begun to diversify, and last season Weimar shipped 5757 bales of cotton (1500 bales being now held by farmers), fifty-nine cars of potatoes, three cars of onions, one car of cabbage and several cars of pecans. Weimar is considered the best market for chickens, turkeys and eggs on the Southern Pacific. The shipments each year of these three articles amounts up into the thousands of dollars.
