NATURAL BEAUTY

Of The Location of City of Columbus.

Columbus, Texas. In 1822, eighty-six years ago, Peter Tuminson, John Tuminson, Thomas Burns, J. E. W. Wallace, W. B. Dewees, Jesse Barnham, Leander Beason, William Alley, and Ross Alley erected a stockade on the west bank of the Colorado river and banded themselves together to repel marauding Indian bands. Located in a spot of natural beauty, their number was gradually augmented and improvements followed as the years passed by. From the wilderness Columbus has evolved to a town of 2000 population, with creditable modern conveniences. It has a first class water works system, electric light plant, two schools, four churches, one of the finest opera houses in the State and many beautiful homes. Its chief charms are a beautiful location, its beautiful trees, a high social plane and its ancient lineage.

The evolution of improvement continues. Lately the principal streets of the town have been regraded and graveled, and a substantial cement drain near the river constructed by Citizen Fixit Odum. The water for the water works system is now obtained from a series of driven wells instead of the river, as formerly.

Messrs. Tanner & Woots have installed an electric fan system, which is in general use in the stores and will later be extended to the residence sections of the town.

The Colorado Citizen is the pioneer newspaper of the county, has taken out the old Campbell press and substituted a Babcock, run by a gasoline engine instead of "nigger" power.

The county commissioners have let a contract for the addition of a steel span, 180 feet in length, to the east wagon bridge across the river. L. P. Dick is building a \$5000 new residence, and C. R. Grobe has let the contract for a residence which will cost about the same.

C. A. Burtchell announces that he will have in operation at the beginning of next season an ice factory that will supply the needs of Columbus, Waco, Schulenburg and Flatonia. Trade Edition, Houston Post.
