Iowa Man Buys 1,611 Acres of Colorado County Land.

Mr. D. M. Bringham and wife have returned to their home in Des Moines, Iowa, after a visit to Colorado County.

Mr. Bringham has purchased 1,611 acres of rice land near Eagle Lake, and after visiting San Antonio and Brownwood will remain in Des Moines long enough to close his business affairs there and will then move his family to Texas and establish a permanent residence here.

He spoke most emphatically of his belief in the wonderful future of Texas and his impressions of the advantages offered to settlers from the North. Mr. Bringham is a substantial business man and a successful farmer. He has been a resident of Polk County, Iowa, for thirty-three years, and was the first Democrat elected sheriff of that county ever had. He is eminently of that type of settler most desired in Texas, the successful man from other states who wishes to establish a home in a country just on the verge of a great development, and to insure his children a prosperous future in a land of plenty.

"There is now no place so good for the people of the North, who are in a position to leave their country to move to," he said in conversation. "I have been posting myself for five years in regard to Texas, and since coming down here this trip I have traveled around over it a good deal, and before going back to Iowa will have visited almost all of the sections, and I want to say it is a good state anywhere. It doesn't matter where a settler happens to land he will not fail to find a favorable soil, a profitable future and every natural advantage one could desire."

"I have bought 1,611 acres of land near Garwood, Colorado County, near the river, and will put this in rice this year. I am going back to Des Moines, 'sell out,' and expect to be back to Texas, to live here the rest of my days, in a couple of months."

"It is my belief that next year any number of Canadian and Northern settlers will be coming to Texas, and that the influx of settlers will at least be double next year that came past year. In the North they are experiencing an unusually early frost and the farmers are becoming discouraged at unusually early frosts year after year. North Dakota and Canada are going to be prime factors in furnishing the tide of settlers to Texas, who come because of these frosts."

"These outside settlers will build up the state as nothing else could do, for outside capital is required to develop its resources. The history of the state, in a way, has been a history of the state. When my father moved to Polk County, Iowa, fifty-three years ago he bought land for \$3 an acre which today can not be bought for \$150. That is the idea I have in comparing Texas history with that of Illinois and saying that it will require much less time in the new state."

"It is my idea that factories are required to properly develop the state, and that they will be forthcoming without question. No article that I can think of is manufactured in the North which could be just as well be made in this state. There is one important thing to take into consideration which gives Texas the advantage. The laborers, the workers in the factories, could live much cheaper in Texas and

would therefore be more contented and would give better work. For one thing they would not be called upon to endure the severe winters of the North with attendant expenses for fuel, etc. This item alone will prove of great weight when the building of factories begins, as it will over the state."
