Old Citizen Passes Away.

Mr. Edo Kollman, a prosperous merchant of this county, died at his home at Freisburg at 7 o'clock last Friday morning. Mr. Kollman was born at Oldenburg, in Germany, October 25, 1832. He came to America in 1857 and was bookkeeper for a firm at Gonzales until he became familiar with the English language. He moved to Freisburg in 1862, where he organized and was made captain of a company that served for the Confederacy during the civil war. He started a mercantile business at Freisburg after the close of the war and accumulated a good share of this world's goods. He married in this county and has raised eleven children. They are Edward, Mrs. Emma Boescher, Fritz, Robert, Mrs. Anna Maxwell, Mrs. Ida Wangerman, Louis, Mrs. Anna Mitchell, Mrs. Lena Baron, Edvin and Miss Opheila. His widow survives him. The funeral was held from the family residence at the Lutheran church at Freisburg. Mr. Kollman was the grandfather of Mr. Tom Kollmann of this city.
