WEIMAR STATE BANK CLOSED.

Part of Capital Stock in Notes That Couldn't be Realized on.

Weimar, Texas, Sept. 22.—The First State Bank of Weimar was closed this afternoon at 4 o'clock by State Bank Examiner Augustine De Zavalla, who will take charge until a special agent arrives.

This bank was opened for business August 19, with a capital stock of \$25,000. A part of the capital stock was in the form of notes upon which the bank could not realize; hence action taken by the bank examiner after consultation with the State commissioner of banking and insurance. The deposits at the close of business today amounted to \$8200.

LOVE DIRECTS STATE CONTROL. Austin, Texas, Sept. 22.—R. M. Love, commissioner of insurance and banking, today directed Bank Examiner De Zavalla to take charge of and close the First State Bank of Weimar, Texas. Mr. Love gave out the following statement:

"The First State Bank of Weimar was closed because of an impairment. The bank has only a small amount of deposits, and has ample cash to meet all claims of depositors and other creditors. N. A. Sayer of Temple, Texas, was appointed special agent to take charge of the bank until it is determined whether or not it can be enabled to resume business."

Austin, Texas, Sept. 22.—The Commissioner of Insurance and Banking today closed the First State Bank of Weimar on charges of serious impairment of its capital stock. Augustine De Zavalla, State Bank Examiner, is in charge of the institution. The bank is capitalized at \$25,000. The examiner said that of this amount at the opening of the bank about \$1000 was paid in cash.

Notes of subscribers were taken for a large quantity of the capital stock, the intentions being to place the notes with other banks. He further says that notes were placed thus to an amount of about \$15,000, leaving an impairment of about \$10,000, on which representation the bank was closed. The bank was incorporated August 19 this year. The only statement of the institution, made at the close of business August 20, shows its resources to have been \$27,250. Its deposits aggregated on this date \$1723. J. B. Holman is president of the bank and F. B. Holman is cashier.

MAY REORGANIZE BANK. Weimar, Tex., Sept. 23.—Since the closing of the First State Bank of Weimar yesterday afternoon, there is much talk of the bank officials reorganizing with a smaller capital and resuming business. It is possible such action will be taken within the next few days.

Rosh Hashonah.

With the ending of the light Friday evening will be ushered in the Jewish New Year, which is the most important day in the Jewish calendar. All the places of business of the Jewish merchants will be closed today (Saturday).

According to the Jewish chronology and according to their records, the creation of the world was completed 5668 years ago, and the close of yesterday, ushers in the year 5669. Rosh Hashonah literally means the head of the year.

It is a day of solemn introspection, a day when the faithful Hebrew visits his temple and worships God in his own earnest fashion.

Tradition invests the day with special solemnity, for it is supposed to be a general judgment day, when the deeds that men have done come up for review before the throne of God.

The day of Rosh Hashonah, or

the beginning of the new year, which is by far the most important religious institution for Judaism, has many definitions assigned to it. It is designated primarily as the day of trumpets' sound, Yom Teruah; Yom Hazzikoron, or day of memorial, are all appellations, which imply the deep and moral sentiment relating to this holiday.

Damage Suits Settled.

Three suits in the district court against the Santa Fe Ry. Co., aggregating over \$287,000, were settled this week by the railroad company paying the plaintiffs \$205 in each case and the costs. The suits were brought by Ed. R. Frnk, J. F. Frnk and J. F. Schoellmann of Garwood, claiming that the said Santa Fe was guilty of extortion for overcharging to the total amount of \$53 on several merchandise shipments from Eagle Lake to Garwood. Judge Kennon ruled that \$500 would be the maximum amount that each plaintiff could recover, and there was considerable doubt whether this penalty could be legally enforced as the track

that runs into Garwood is a loop or spur of the main line, and it is questionable whether or not the railroad commission has jurisdiction over this portion of the road. The railroad company evidently preferred to settle for a moderate sum than to appeal. The railroad company was represented by Lee C. Ayars, Esq., of Houston, J. W. Terry of Galveston, and H. A. Townsend, Esq., of this city; the plaintiffs by Brown, Carothers & Brown, Esqs., Columbus and Eagle Lake. —Colorado Citizen.
